INTERNATIONAL BRIDGE TOURNAMENT 2010 30th October to 2nd November 2010 HOTEL RADISSON, NOIDA, INDIA

Under the auspices of Bridge Federation of India

Summary Report

The 8th HCL International Bridge Tournament was held at Hotel Radisson, NOIDA, India from 30th October to 2nd November 2010 under the auspices of **Bridge Federation of India**. With total prize money of Rupees 1.4 Million (approx. 31,000 USD), this tournament is currently the highest Prize Money Bridge Tournament of India.

The Tournament had 2 events - the Team of Four event for the "Naresh Tandan Trophy" and the Open Pairs event for the "Neena Bonarji Trophy".

As expected An excellent turnout of **89 teams -** including 11 foreign teams, which participated in the recently concluded 3rd Commonwealth Nations Bridge Championship and 78 teams from all parts of India, was seen in action in the Team of Four event.

Texan Aces, Dhampur Sugar Mills, Formidables, Shree Cement, Poddar Developers, Promila Saraf, Hemant K. Jalan, Arun Jain, and Maya Meera Sneha were some of the top Indian teams which participated in this prestigious tournament. The foreign teams were **Magic Eyes** from Thailand, **Hackett** from England, **Hans & Braithwaite from Australia, Scotland, Sri Lanka, England, Bangladesh, Kenya (Ashwin), Kenya Safari Group & Uganda.**

Team of Four Event for "Naresh Tandan Trophy":

Round Robin Stage:

The event comprised of 10 rounds of round robin (each 10 boards) resulting in the top 8 teams to qualify for the quarterfinals.

At the end of first day (after 6 rounds), **MAGIC EYES**, comprising of Rhunying Chodchoy, Somchai Baisamut, Vallapa Svangsopakyl, Asdang Riamsree and Charnchai Svangsopakyl led the event with **122 VPs**. **Shree Cement** (Kamal Roy, S.P. Ghosh, Badal Das, P.S. Mukherjee, V.M. Lal, R. Bhiwandkar) were in second place with **120 VPs**. Hemant K. Jalan (114 VPs) were in 3rd place and Sunil's Team was in 4th place with 113 VPs. The 5th & 6th place was shared by Arun Jain & Hackett with 112 VPs. At 7th place was HANS, Australia with 111 VPs and England team were on 8th place with 108 VPs.

After playing 4 more rounds on the second day, **Hemant K. Jalan's** Team (H.K. Jalan, Ashish Malhotra, G.B. Sinha, A. Bagaria, A. Lahiri & A. Kundu) with **186 VPs**, topped the 10 round Swiss league, to finalize the quarter-finalists. Scotland (Derek Diamond, Derek Sanders, Brian Spears, Sandy Duncan, John Murdoch & Irvine Gordan) were 2nd with 184 VPs. The day-1 leaders **MAGIC EYES** (Rhunying Chodchoy, Somchai Baisamut, Vallapa Svangsopakyl, Asdang Riamsree abd Charnchai Svangsopakyl) had to settle for the 8th position. Shree Cement, Hackett from England, England team, Promila Saraf, Texan Aces (the reigning champions), Dhampur Sugar Mills and Maya Meera Sneha were some of the top teams which did not qualify for the quarterfinals.

With last round to go, England were in good position playing on table 3 but had a real bad set against Jalan's team losing 25-3 to go out of the contention, whereas Poddar Developers on table-5 had a nice set against Boat House Club in the last round beating them 24-6 to enter the quarter-finals.

The qualified teams had the right to choose their opponents as per the priority of their ranking in the round robin stage. **The Quarterfinal line up was:**

Semi-final Stage:

The Semi final line up was: **Hemant K. Jalan (#1) Vs. HANS (#4) & Poddar Developers (#2) Vs. Arun Jain (#3).** Both the semi-final matches turned out to be nail biting.

In the first of the 3*16 board semi-final, **HANS** (Sartaj Hans, Tony Nunn, Arjuna Delivera, Ian Robinson, Paul Gosney & Peter Gill) beat Hemant K. Jalan (H K Jalan, A Malhotra, G. B. Sinha, A. Bagaria, A. Lahiri, A. Kundu) by 30 IMPs (148-130). The match was very close till the second last board where HANS gained 11 IMPs bidding a cold grand slam. Their opponents bid only six and that was the end of road to finals for Jalan's team.

In the second semi-final, **Arun Jain** (Arun Jain, Manas Mukherjee, Rana Roy, Subir Majumder, Subrata Saha, Krishna Kumar) beat Poddar Developers (Deepak Poddar, Kirbakan Murthy, R. A. Agrawal, K. S. Samant, J. Solani, Uttam Gupta) by **4 IMPs** (**99-95**). Though Arun Jain was in driver seat with last round to go but Poddar Developers gave a good fight and gained 25 IMPs to make the match very interesting. The semi-final scores:

The open room auction came alive when Subhash Gupta probably playing Capellati bid 2H to show Hearts and a minor. Who the hand belonged to no one knew till the dummy came down.

The live auction saw north get in with 2S. What is poor East to do holding two doubletons. It looked like partner having the red suits, so east passed. South raised to 3S and Subhash doubled to show a better hand. East bid 4C expecting partner to bid his red suit and must have been surprised to become the declarer. South Passed 4C, which was the killer bid, as it transpired, even though 4S is a toss at the wall.

The closed room auction was equally esoteric. West bid 2C, DON'T, to show clubs and another suit making life less complicated for partner. North got in with 2S and east after freely bidding 3C took the save, bidding 5C over south's duly bid and making game bid of 4S. He got duly whacked and was very pleasantly surprised when 5C doubled was made by the partner. Declarer ruffed the spade lead and played the DQ, won by south, who shifted to the HK. Winning the HA, he cashed the DJ, ruffed a spade in hand and threw his losing heart on the diamond king. South was welcome to ruff. That was the last trick for the defence. Declarer lost the DA and a ruff.

The I-Doctors from Mumbai treated themselves to a 9 Imp pick up thanks to the DON'T system.

A pretty little hand popped up where declarer scored his H6 enpassant, timing the hand perfectly



On the lead of the H8 declarer played the H9, covered by the 10 and won with the A. Next came the DA, spade ruff in hand, CA, club ruff, DK, spade ruff, DQ, club ruff, SQ, covered, ruffed and over ruffed by east with HQ. Declarer had scored three diamonds, CA and two club ruffs, HA, and two spade ruffs for nine tricks. This was the scenario in the three card ending:



Whatever east returns now the H6 was the 10^{th} trick.

The South in the open room fell in love with his cards and bid a solo 4S spurning a 5-3 heart fit. Dummy produced a trump void and he lost 3 trumps and a heart to give Formidables 12 Imps.

What would you lead sitting North in the open room against 3NT after the above auction?

Paul Hackett led the Heart Ace!!! It was a Gallery Lead when it fetched the king from declarer.

Declarer went down three, vulnerable. Of course without the lead too the contract would go down when North comes in with the CK. He must find the HA shift. Hackett made it more dramatic and brilliant when he led it. Take a bow Mr. Hackett.

Not being satisfied with having found the brilliant HA lead from AQ in 3NT, Hackett had become the Hatchet opening a weak two with the north hand in the open room. Callahan sitting east for England passed and South bid 3Ds showing a heart fit and diamonds goodies for a lead.

Killer Callahan judged the hand beautifully to bid an otherwise tough slam. Figuring that partner would be void in hearts and looking at a singleton diamond in hand he pressed the button, the good old Black, and finding the necessary dope- two key cards and the trump Q bid the slam. On a dutiful diamond lead by north and a trump shift by south declarer wrapped up the slam ruffing 3 diamonds on the table, along with six trumps in his hand and the CAK and HA.

Callahan with A Little Help From His Friends worked out the scenario neatly.

The hand doesn't end here. On a trump lead can you make it?

Trump lead, diamond to ace and trump back where do you go? *Try to think Double Squeezes.* If north has to guard the heart and South the Diamond who will guard the clubs, huh?

Cashing the HA, declarer can ruff two diamonds and two hearts and now play his trumps out. Here's how it looks with west on lead with the last trump:

On the last trump north must part with the club. Having expended its utility dummy lets go the HJ and now its south's turn to feel the heat.
