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Welcome to the 17th Edition of HCL International Bridge Championship

Dear friends,

A hearty welcome to all of you. This journey started 17 years ago and keeps picking up the momentum year after year. Like last year, the **17**th **Edition** is again being held at **JW Mariott Hotel**, New Delhi from August 5 - 10, 2019. As the participating teams are increasing, we have tried to increase the playing space considerably to reduce the congestion.

With prize money of Rupees 18 Million (more than US \$ 250,000), this is currently one of the highest Prize Money Tournament in the world and we are striving to make it the most popular tournament in the coming years.

Last year, we had 52 Teams in the Gold & 110 Teams in the Silver event and are again expecting 160 plus teams this year. However due to various reasons, the foreign teams participation has reduced this time. 12 foreign teams will participate in the GOLD event along with the Indian Stalwarts. The reigning Gold event champions, Team "South Sweden", a combination of South Africa & Sweden led by Alon Aptekar will again be here to lock horns. The other foreign teams constitute of players from Bulgaria, Russia, USA, Sweden, Netherlands, Israel, Poland, Italy, France, Thailand & Bangladesh. Phyllipe Cronier (France) and Giorgio Duboin (Italy) have joined my team consisting of Sunit Chokshi, Jaggy Shivdasani and Sandeep Thakral in an Indo-French and Italy combine.

For Indian bridge teams the tournament has an added attraction, as this tournament is a qualifying event under "Indian Team Selection Policy 2019-22" and will follow BFI's ranking system to give performance points to the top winners of the event. The participation of all the top Indian teams in this tournament is ample proof that this is one of the most favourite tournaments of the bridge fraternity in India.

The tournament is the brainchild of Mrs. Kiran Nadar - one of the top Indian players. She is member and sponsor of the **"FORMIDABLES"** team, which has not only won many laurels at National level but has represented India umpteen times in International events. They reached the finals of the Gold event last year but had to contend with the runner-up spot.

The event consists of the Team of Four as well as an Open Pairs event. To make the tournament more competitive, the Team of Four event is played in two categories – **GOLD & SILVER**. This year, we have added a **BRONZE** event category to promote the game for the beginners.



The "Team of Four GOLD Event" Trophy of the tournament has been instituted in the name of Late Shri Naresh Tandan (Mrs. Kiran Nadar's father), and the "Team of Four SILVER Event" Trophy of the tournament has been instituted in the name of Late Mrs. Mohini Tandan (Mrs. Kiran Nadar's mother), whereas the "Open Pairs" Trophy of the tournament is instituted in the name of Late Mrs. Neena Bonarji by Nisha, daughter of the late Mrs. Neena Bonarji. Mrs. Kiran Nadar had played with Mrs. Bonarji as partner and teammate over the years.

Like previous years, we will have Vu-graph coverage of the event from day-1 on BBO. All the events of the tournament will be played with computer generated boards and the scoring of the events will be done through Bridgemates. There will also be a Daily Bulletin for the event. We have also made provisions of a Vu-graph theatre at the venue and players can watch the top notch matches there.

Few important points to note -

There will be strict penalties for any of the following violations:

Late arrival at the table – Players should be at the table at least 5 minutes before the start of the session. This practice allows your opponents and you to discuss the system and clarify any doubts. Not everybody is aware of what "YOU PLAY" or what "THEY PLAY"

Noise level – Unnecessary noise by any pair at the table will be taken note of and suitable warning-cum-penalty will be levied to act as a deterrent and to play in a silent atmosphere.

Mobile Phones - You will be allowed to keep your mobile with you in the playing area provided it is in "Switched off" mode. There will be random checks at various tables and the violators – please look out – NO MERCY and heavy penalties.

Smoke, Tea and Toilet breaks – Should be avoided when the session is in play. Only in an emergency, a director can allow a toilet break, with a monitor to escort the person. No random smoke break and no random tea break.

Convention cards – Everybody has to carry a copy of their convention card and supplementary sheets (if any). People should avoid saying – "Not Discussed", "New partnership". At least make sure that you tell your opponents what your agreements are or what your understanding is of a particular bid. Leads and carding should be clearly defined when asked.!!

UNDUE hesitations or gestures should be AVOIDED.

SPECIAL REQUEST TO ALL MY INDIAN BRIDGE FRIENDS:

We all have to make an effort to truly make this a tournament of International standards.

HCL can only provide the platform and provide excellent facilities but we have to show by example how a world class event is conducted. Many people from India have participated in world championships and they all know how well people behave. There is PIN-DROP silence while the session is in progress. They do not allow any breaks except a toilet break in an emergency. Those senior players should be the examples for others to follow.

WE have many foreign guests and we want them to go back with good memories, so that the tournament becomes even more popular world-wide.

LET US ALL BE COURTEOUS to them in particular and to all in general. We should maintain some decorum and not try to jump to the front of the Queue!!

Best of luck to all and please play the game in right spirit.

The Mark Of A Man



Mark Horton, arguably one of the world's premier bridge analyst, writer, editor, author, what have you, will be covering these Championships for the Daily Bulletin. An honour indeed. Welcome Aboard!

As a teaser he sent us this piece, which we happily bring to you. Take it away, Mark.

JAI HO - Mark Horton

How best to mark the start of one of the most exciting events in the calendar, the 2019 HCL Bridge Championships?

Anyone who was fortunate enough to be at the World Championships in Chennai in 2015 will know what to expect at a tournament in India, - a fantastic welcome, flawless organisation and fierce competition.

Everyone will be hoping to be at the top of his or her game, but sometimes, when things go wrong, the bridge gods will smile on you. Let's look at a deal where destiny played a part:

With neither side vulnerable, you, South pick up a modest looking hand:

The player on your right opens 2♣, promising a weak hand with diamonds or a strong hand. When West responds 2♦ your partner doubles. Not sure how to get both majors into the picture, you jump to 4♠ and your partner continues with 4NT. When you show your lack of key cards partner's jump to 6♠ leaves you with this auction:

West leads the \$\dagger\$J and you see why partner was so enthusiastic:

◆ AKJ10
◆ A64



You win with dummy's ♣A, East following with the ♣5 and dispose of your second club on the DA. If you can avoid losing two trumps you will have to locate the ♥Q.

To guard against the possibility that West holds a singleton ♠ A you want to start trumps from hand, so you ruff a club, on which East follows with the queen and play a spade, for the seven, king and four. Now you can guard against West having started with ♠ AJ7, so you ruff a club and play a spade - at least that was your intention, but East ruffs the third club with the ♠ J and I you are one down.

This was the full deal:

Dealer East. None Vul.



Post Mortem

Once the ♠K held declarer could have ruffed a diamond and played a second spade. West wins and exits in a minor, but declarer will now get a count and know that East started with three hearts, indicating which way to take the heart finesse.

That is not the end of the matter - as you will have spotted, West should have taken the first spade and played a third club - this time destiny took a hand in proceedings.

If declarer assumes the diamonds are 6-3 it is safe to ruff a diamond at trick three and play a spade. Then a club can be ruffed for another spade play and declarer will again get a count of the defenders hands.

In the other room, they stopped in $4 \stackrel{\blacktriangle}{•}$.

When the trophies, are raised later this week, who will be singing *Jai Ho*?



ASHOK RUIA - REST IN PEACE



Ashok Ruia was one of the most affable and pleasant personalities Indian bridge has been blessed with. The day of 7 Jan 2019 was his stepping stone to heaven. An end play that shocked the Indian bridge fraternity.

His iconic team, India Blues, was one of the hallmarks of Indian bridge. His partnership with the legendary late Orlando Campos was one of India's most famous partnerships. Ollie's standard response to their arguments, was immortalised in one line, "Sorry, my fault."

Ashok and his team ruled the roost in the 1980s and '90s. After Ollie's death, Ashok partnered K. Venkatraman, J. M. Shah and Archie Sequeira regularly over the next 20-30 years. He used to whistle his way through any situation and hum old Hindi songs, attributes that left lasting imprints on the minds of the bridge fraternity. And he was a wily old fox, when it came to table presence and card play.

Ashok was one of the most benevolent sponsors of Indian bridge, contributing immensely till the very end. He was the go-to person for the big back-page, inside cover ads, and what have you. We sure will miss Ashokji.

The Rise Of The Phoenix

Ashok's company, Phoenix Mills Ltd, symbolises the essence of the man.

Like the mythological bird, the **Phoenix**, who rose from the ashes, so too **the Spirit of Ashok Ruia**, has risen from the ashes to be here right amongst us. He was a good man. **Bhaiji**, **Rest In Peace**

Remembering Ashok Ruia

His partners reminesce about him

The event was a big prize money, an Imp Cavendish pairs event. It was early days of my partnership with Sri Ashok Ruia, the year 1997. Sitting North as dealer with NS Vul, Ashok



picked up -♠-X ♥-X D-AKQJ10XXXX ♣-XX. He passed in a flash. His LHO opened 1♥. I, South, passed. West bid 1♠. Ashok passed again smoothly. His LHO(East) bid 1NT. South passed. West now jumped to 4♥. Ashok, at last emerged from the bushes & bid 5 ♦ which East doubled. All pass. Result - 5♦ Doubled made with Partner obligingly producing \(\frac{1}{2} \)- AQ as his only high cards. With Club finesse in, Ashok claimed This turned out to be a big IMP pickup as most tables faced either a gambling 3NT / 5 ♦ opening over which opponents bid to $4 \checkmark / 4 \spadesuit$ or $5 \checkmark / 5 \spadesuit$ which was a cheap save, mostly undoubled. When I wonderingly asked Ashok what prompted his unusual action, he smilingly gave a cryptic answer - "Let water find its own level." In a nutshell this summed up Ashok's approach to bridge. -bold innovative & farsighted. It was always an experience partnering Ashok, trying to fathom his mental processes. But remember - Ashok was a winner at the bridge table. He may have bid imaginatively but he played his cards accurately both as Declarer & defender. In his demise, Indian bridge world has lost one of it's most colorful personalities, a great administrator and sponsor.

There is a saying in Sanskrit, "Vidya Vinayen Shobhate", which, loosely translated means that knowledge and wisdom suit well those who are humble and polite. Tweaking that saying to,



"Dhan Vinayen Shobhate", applies aptly to Ashokji, probably the only example I have come across of a humble multi millionaire. He was humility personified; always used to talk by leaning and with his eyes down.

He was very fond of me, and always used to consult me on various aspects and information on bridge. He was a very fine player, who loved and enjoyed bridge gossip.

An ardent supporter of the game and a benevolent sponsor, he loved Seniors Events, and had an ambition to

perform in the Seniors at the world level. He twice missed to qualify for the quarter finals of the World Championships Seniors, the Ernesto d'Orsi trophy, by the narrowest of margins.

I sincerely hope that if any senior event is added in India bridge, it should go with his name.

Ashokji, Rest In Peace

Archie Sequeira

Ashok's partnership with me started in 2007. I had known him as a doyen of Indian bridge over the years with his strong Ruia Team dominating the bridge scene in Bombay in the



70's & 80's. More particularly I knew him as an opponent with a natural flair for the game, a great table presence and sharpness both in hand play and defence. I was pleasantly surprised when he asked me to partner him. We played mostly in his - Seniors events and the Winter Nationals. The team's performance in Seniors was creditable. We won the Asia & Middle East Championships in Karachi in 2007. Ashok's contribution in this event was memorable. In the finals vs Pakistan, the teams were tied at the finish. So, we were required to play 8 more deals. Ashok had to catch a flight and we settled for four deals. Defending against opponents 6 NT, Ashok made a devastating lead of VJ from KJ10X. For some strange reason, declarer ducked from Q9x in Dummy.

(He figured ♥K must be doubleton with RHO). The cold contract went down. Declarer grumbled, "What sort of lead is this? Who leads J from KJ10 in a slam contract?). This deal saved the day for us and we won in comfort. Else, would have lost narrowly, by 1 Imp

Ashok's natural flair, uncanny intelligence, commonsense, unflappable character and indomitable spirit (Never Say Die) won him so many laurels.

He was a great supporter of the game and helped many bridge players through his benevolence. An amiable and pleasant disposition endeared him to one and all, especially the bridge ladies. He was their favourite! Simple living and high thinking was his hallmark. His untimely departure is a great loss to Indian Bridge.



17th HCL International Bridge Championship 2019 – A Curtain Raiser

The HCL Bridge Championship was established in the year 2003 by Mrs. Kiran Nadar, one of the top Indian players of competitive bridge, to promote the sport in India. This year's tournament offers Rs 18 Million (~ US \$257,000) as prize money to winners.

Mrs. Kiran Nadar is a member of the "FORMIDABLES" team, which has not only won many laurels at the National level but has represented India several times in international competitive bridge events. In fact her team reached the finals of the Gold event last year but had to contend with the runner-up spot. She is married to **Mr. Shiv Nadar** who is the **Founder of HCL**, India's leading Global Technology and IT Enterprise - which is the sponsor for this prestigious event.

This annual tournament consists of the "Team of Four Gold and Silver" events as well as "Open Pairs and IMP Pairs" events. This year, we have added a BRONZE event category to promote the game for the beginners.

The first edition of this tournament in 2003 attracted 35 teams & 89 Pairs; in 2004, it increased to 46 teams and 127 pairs; 2005 saw 70 teams & 176 Pairs, and from 2006 onwards till 2012, we always had 70 plus teams & 160 plus Pairs. The participation of all the top Indian teams in this tournament was an ample proof that this is one of the most favorite tournaments of the bridge fraternity in India and to make it more competitive for average players, the organizers in 2013 decided to divide the main Team of Four event into GOLD & SILVER categories. 40 teams in GOLD & 37 teams in Silver categories participated in the 2013 edition.

The year 2016 saw this tournament attaining big heights, when this became an International Bridge Tournament. The organizers invited many top foreign teams and this resulted in 41 teams participating in the GOLD and 79 teams in the SILVER event. A record 288 pairs participated in the open match point pairs. Team "Lavazza", consisting of Zia Mahmood, Giorgio Duboin, Dennis Bilde & Norberto Bochhi won the Gold event. With 21 foreign teams in 2017 edition, the tournament attained a world class status. Last year we had a record 162 Teams (52 in GOLD & 110 in SILVER), which even exceeded the expectation of the organizers.

The three main trophies of the championship are detailed below:

Naresh Tandan Trophy for Winner of Team of Four Gold Event – This trophy has been instituted in the name of Late Shri Naresh Tandan (Mrs. Kiran Nadar's Father). He was an engineer and worked for Voltas most of his life. He was a very compassionate human being and loved the game of Bridge so much that Kiran and her younger brother were initiated into it, when she was all of 9 years old and her brother three years younger.

Mohini Tandan Trophy for Winner of Team of Four Silver Event – This trophy has been instituted in the name of Late Mrs Tandan (Mrs. Kiran Nadar's Mother).

Neena Bonerjee Trophy for Winner of Open MP Pairs Event – This trophy has been instituted in the name of Late Mrs. Neena Bonerjee by her daughter Nisha. Mrs. Neena Bonerjee was a lady par excellence, a true friend, a great player and even a greater ambassador of this game. Kiran was fortunate enough to have played with her as a partner or as a team mate over the years.

What do you lead?

The killing lead was found by Tuana Altun, an eight-year-old girl playing with her brother, Toygar Tuncay Altun.

Tuana led a club. Then, when she regained the lead with the ace of hearts, she led another club. Her brother ruffed the second club to put the contract one down.

This was the full deal:



That represented an 11-IMP gain for their team.

(Guess it's Gr8 to be 8- Ed)

DEFENCE

Justyna Zmuda, Poland

(Championship Defence - Marek Wójcicki, Poland)

In the European Team Championships Women's series, from the Poland-Italy match, Justyna Zmuda was sitting East with: ♠AQ1053 ♥ K8 ♠A876 ♣97

With both sides vulnerable, the bidding went ...

After a 15-17 notrump and transfer, Zmuda led the diamond ace. This is what she saw:




South (Dummy)

On the diamond ace, the nine appeared from partner and the two from declarer. What next?

Except for diamond honours, partner has at most a jack. Thus, there is no hope for a trick in clubs. The only chance was in trumps. Zmuda found the only defence to defeat 4♥. Zmuda cashed the spade ace (Dufrat followed with the four, upside-down signals) and continued with another spade (eight from Dufrat). When declarer took the second spade in hand with the jack and played the ace of trumps and another, Zmuda won with her king and played one more spade, promoting a trick for the trump jack and setting the contract.

Board 4. Dealer West. Both Vul.



It was the only table in the Women's series where the contract was set.

(The only chance- Leading the ace from ace- queen, giving declarer a 5 card spade suit in spite of the 1 NT opening, hoping to find partner wit the trump jack..... And it all fell into place. Good on ya, Justyna-Ed)


DECLARER PLAY

Barbara Travis, Australia

(Another Happy Ending - Ron Klinger, Australia)


This deal comes from the Australian Women's Teams semifinals:

Board 37. Dealer East. EW Vul.



With East/West silent, it went one spade by South–two clubs (natural, forcing to game)–two diamonds–four spades–four notrump–five clubs–six spades–pass. West led her singleton eight of clubs–three–jack–queen. As this was dummy's suit, Barbara Travis (South) took the lead to be a singleton. She also placed the ace of hearts with East. Why would West lead a singleton in dummy's suit if West had the heart ace?

If South drew trumps and cashed the ten of clubs, she had no sure entry to dummy to reach the clubs. Accordingly, she played the ace of diamonds, ruffed a low diamond and drew trumps. East shed a low heart, a diamond and a club. Declarer played her fifth trump and East pitched another heart, leaving:



South cashed the king of diamonds, discarding the ten of hearts from the dummy, and East was doomed. She discarded the five of hearts. South cashed the ten of clubs and played a heart, using East as the stepping-stone to reach dummy's ace-king of clubs. That was plus 980 and a win of 11 IMPs. At the other three tables, North/South played in four spades.


Punch & Leslie, UK

At some tables, South led the jack of spades. East won with his ace and immediately played back the nine of spades. South covered with the ten and dummy won. Now East made sure of his ninth trick by playing a heart from dummy

towards his king. Later, declarer finessed the seven of spades. The defence could take three clubs and the ace of hearts, but that was all. Nobody noticed anything amiss in the defence and they happily proceeded to the next deal. At one table though, the defenders were wide awake. They were Ajay Khare and Raju Tolani, bronze medallists in the 1st Asian Games Bridge Championship. Khare, South, knew dummy had four cards in spades, so it was pointless to lead the spade jack. He also noted that declarer had four cards in hearts. That left only the club suit, so Khare led the six of clubs. Tolani, North, won with the ace and played back the two of clubs, dropping declarer's queen.

Now Ajay Khare paused for thought. And he found the deadly shift to the seven of hearts; dummy played the eight, Tolani the nine, and declarer won with his king. When declarer cashed the ace of spades and North discarded, East had to resort to the club suit for his ninth trick. He travelled to dummy with the king of diamonds and played a club. Tolani won with his jack and played the jack of hearts. Declarer covered and Khare won. Then, because of the farsighted unblock of the seven of hearts, Khare was able to lead the five of hearts to partner's six. The four of hearts brought the three from declarer to take the contract two down.

It was a perfect defensive intra-finesse, normally considered to be a prerogative of the declarer.

(The defense worked in harmony and tandem like a well oiled machine. Even a low heart shift au lieu of the seven would suffice for down one. But the early unblock of the heart seven gave them all the marbles for down two!- Ed)
