EA Teams Lead After Five Gruelling Rounds

Five demanding rounds of Swiss Bridge concluded yesterday evening, setting the stage for a tense finish in the **GOLD category**. In a field rich with talent, the two **EA teams** have surged ahead — **EA Bridge** (Koushik Mukerjee, Priya Ranjan Sinha, Badal Das, Shibnath De Sarkar, and Pranab Bardhan) lead the table with **79.31 VPs**, a commanding six VP margin. Close behind are their stablemates, **Express Avenue** (Wojciech Gawel, Przemyslaw Janiszewski, Piotr Marcinowski, and Kamil Nowak), representing Poland, on **73.73 VPs**.

Dhampur Sugar Mills (69.21) and **Mohota** (69.13) occupy the next two spots, with **Deep Finesse** (68.68), **Mavericks** (68.51), **OLIMP** (68.01), and **Bridgescanner** (67.29) completing the top eight. Among other prominent names, **Formidables** are ninth on **65.32 VPs**, **WHAM**, last year's champions, are 11th with **63.89 Vps**, while **Shourie**, last year's runners-up, stand 16th with **57.30 VPs**.

Five more rounds remain before the top sixteen teams advance to the **quarterfinals**. A total of **58 teams** are contesting the GOLD event.

In the SILVER category, Ashok Bedi lead convincingly with 86.13 VPs, followed by ERNIS (77.71), Dazzle (71.38), and Chefs Table (69.14). Unbalanced (67.62), Savvy Acers (65.71), Gladiators (65.49), and Ranjan (64.97) complete the top eight from a field of 88 teams.

Round 1 Swiss League: Mavericks Vs. Diamonds

The Team event of the 22nd HCL International Bridge Tournament got underway yesterday morning. There are 58 Teams in the GOLD category and 88 in the SILVER category. Play from two matches, that is, four Tables, was shown on VU Graph on BBO.


Diamonds (Maxim Savisochenko, Diana Rakhmani, Tatiana Nokhaeva, and Aleksandr Piatkov) vs. Mavericks (Anal Shah – NPC, Subodh Maskara, Aniruddha Bhattacharya, Ami Zamir, Oren Toledano, Boye Brogeland, Keyzad Anklesaria) match was one of the two matches on view. In the Open Room Maxim Savisochenko and Diana Rakhmani were North-South respectively while Ami Zamir-Oren Toledano were West-East.

The very first deal brought up a squeeze. Have a look at the minor suits in the West hand. West hand alone controls the third round of diamonds. Similarly, all the defenders' cards above $\clubsuit 9$ are also in the West hand. Bidding was straightforward. East led the $\spadesuit 3$. West won and backed $\spadesuit T$. Declarer won the $\spadesuit K$ and advanced a trump. Toledano won pronto and gave partner a Spade ruff. Ami Zamir now backed the $\clubsuit J$.




Maxim made no mistake in executing the squeeze that might have seemed like a distant dream when he won the A. Maxim simply cashed trumps to reach the following ending.

West alone was guarding both the minor suits. If West discarded a Diamond, Maxim's \blacklozenge 6 would have won the 10th trick. At the table, Ami Zamir spent a bit of time to find a good discard, but it was a hopeless situation. Zamir discarded \clubsuit T. Maxim cashed the \clubsuit K and went to the table with the \blacklozenge King to cash the now good \clubsuit 9. That was a nicely executed squeeze.




You might wonder if West could have backed the ◆Q or the ◆J to break the squeeze. Well, it would break the simple squeeze, but another variety of squeeze, a crisscross squeeze would still be available for the Declarer.




Declarer wins the $\$ King in the hand and rattles of trumps discarding the $\$ Ten from the Dummy. This would be the last four card position with West yet to discard. If West discards a Diamond, Declarer cashes the $\$ And gets back to the Closed hand with a top Club to enjoy the good Diamond. If West discards a Club, Declarer begins by cashing the $\$ AK. Dummy would have the last two winners with the $\$ Ace and the $\$ 9.



In the other room Brogeland-Keyzad reached $4 \checkmark$ when Brogeland employed a good Bergen raise to respond to Keyzad's $1 \checkmark$ opening. Keyzad rebid $4 \checkmark$ and made the contract with a neat endplay.

♣7 was led. Keyzad won and advanced a Trump. Tatiana won the ♥A and played back the ♥Q. Keyzad won ♥K in Dummy, cashed the remaining top Club in the North hand, went to the table with the ♦A, ruffed a Club, cashed the ♦K, and exited with a Diamond. West was now on lead in this position. West had to either lead away from the ♠Ace or give a ruff and sluff. Mavericks won six IMPs for that effort. Running Scores: Mavericks 6, Diamonds 0.



In the other match on the Vu Graph, Rajeshwar Tewari – Sumit Mukherjee played in 3♥. Tewari missed the squeeze. He made only nine tricks. In the other room, Shrikant Tembey-Yogesh Shah bid 4♥. Shrikant Tembey brought it home with the same endplay that Keyzad employed. That was worth seven IMPs.

On 18 out of 58 tables in the GOLD category, $4 \checkmark$ was bid and made. On 15 other tables, the Declarer was able to make 10 tricks. On 8 tables, Declarer could make only nine tricks playing in a Heart partial. On six tables, Declarers failed in $4 \checkmark$.

Team Diamonds won three IMPs on Board 2. Toledano opened 1Nt in the Open Room showing 10-12 HCP and Ami Zamir jumped to 3Nt. Diana Rakhmani led the ♥K. Toledano won, cleared ♣AQ discovering the bad break. He next went to Dummy with a top Diamond, cashed ♣King, and conceded a Club to South. Diana now cashed all her Hearts and pushed a Spade for two more tricks. Down three was the result. +150 to North-South.



In the Open Room, Tatiana dealt and opened 1♥. West responded 2♣ and North bid 2♥ to show Spades and Diamonds. South now had a difficult bid, but there was little option other than 2♠. Brogeland took that option. West's 3Nt Closed the auction. Keyzad led a small Spade. Declarer won, cleared Clubs, and went to Dummy with a top Diamond to concede the fourth Club to South whereupon North-South cashed four Spade tricks. That was all they made so that contract went down one for 50 to NS. Running Scores: Mavericks 6, Diamonds 3.

On Board 3, Both Wests opened 1 ♦. Maxim overcalled 2♣ in the Open Room while Keyzad doubled. In the Open Room, Toledano doubled 2♣ and Diana raised to 3♣ buying the contract. East led the Diamond 5. Ami Zamir won ♦ A and switched to ♥J. In due course, East-West collected five tricks for a score of 50.



In the Closed room, Tatiana bid 1♥ over Keyzad's double, Piatkov reverted to 2♦ and played there. Keyzad had a difficult lead problem. Had he led a Spade, the contract could have been defeated. The Spade lead takes away a useful entry from the Table. Declarer has to lose two tricks each in ♠, ♦, and ♣. Keyzad chose to lead the ♣A and continued Clubs. Declarer won, dropped the ♦ King, ran a Heart for finesse and eventually discarded both his losing Spades on Dummy's Hearts. Defence only got ♣A and two Trumps. Declarer made 10 tricks for a score of 130 to East-West. Team Diamonds earned two IMPs as a result. Running Scores: Mavericks 6, Diamonds 5. On balance, a Spade lead does seem like a better option than the lead of the ♣A, however, such post facto choice often gets coloured by the result rather than some first principles argument in favour of it, so we have to be careful about making that kind of judgement.


Board four seemed like a flat board from the Open Room. East-West had a leisurely auction to a $4 \, \frac{1}{2} \, \text{game}$. West Opened a strong $1 \, \frac{1}{2} \, \text{,}$ East showed four Spades with a $1 \, \frac{1}{2} \, \text{response}$, West bid his Heart suit and raised Spades next. When West was unable to cue-bid $4 \, \frac{1}{2} \, \text{ at his next turn}$, the auction subsided in a $4 \, \frac{1}{2} \, \text{ game}$. East-West scores +650.



In the Closed Room, the auction took an interesting turn when Brogeland pre-empted 3♦ on East's 1♠ response and Piatkov doubled. Undoubtedly, he intended it as something other than a penalty double. Tatiana seems to have thought it was a penalty double.

Be that as it may, East-West had sufficient defensive tricks in the side suits to defeat the contract. West began with a top Heart, cashed another, cashed the ♣Ace, and shifted, well, what would you have shifted to?



For best defence, East-West had to cash two Spade winners and the ♣K ending in the East hand. East can then push a third Club in the following position. West's ◆Queen now gets a promotion fetching 800 for East-West.

At the table, Piatkov shifted to a small Spade. Tatiana won and backed another Spade anxious to book the setting trick ASAP. She did get the ♣K in the end, however, they missed the chance to secure a promotion for West's ◆Queen. They scored 500 to the score of 650 in the other room and lost four IMPs. Running Scores: Mavericks 10, Diamonds 5.





In the Open Room. Toledano had another chance to pull out their 10-12 1Nt opening sword from the scabbard. North-South seemed to have had a tough time negotiating it on this board. South bid $2 \, \blacklozenge \,$ showing a single suit and Ami Zamir bid $3 \, \blacklozenge \,$, transfer to Hearts. Toledano now jumped to $4 \, \blacktriangledown \,$ giving Diana Rakhmani a bidding headache. With 16 HCP comprising of a lot of soft values, she could well have decided to pass, but she chose to double for takeout. North-South were on the same page for the meaning of that double. Maxim took out to $4 \, \spadesuit \,$ and Toledano doubled. North-South were now looking at a -500 score against a 140 partial, at a fantom sacrifice, so to say, although they seem to have bid it on strength.

The play offered an opportunity for a reverse swing, to borrow a terminology from Cricket. Toledano led the $\clubsuit 2$. Maxim won $\clubsuit A$ in Dummy and tabled the \blacklozenge Jack. Ami Zamir could well have allowed this to pass, but he flew up with the \blacklozenge Ace. Note that South was the Dummy in the Open Room, so Zamir could see the \blacklozenge QJ on the table. He had no reason to worry about losing the \blacklozenge Ace trick.

That trick now left the Declarer with a crucial entry to the Closed hand. Zamir next cashed ♣K and shifted to a Trump with a view to cutting down possible ruffs in the Closed hand. Toledano won and played back another Spade. This was an opportunity for the Declarer. If Maxim had played ♠T (or 9, or 8), he would have made the rest of the tricks by discarding all of Dummy's Hearts on Diamonds. He thought quite long about it, but decided to go up with the ♠K. He had to lose two more tricks for a score of -500. Team Diamonds lost 12 IMPs on the board. Running Scores: Mavericks 22, Diamonds 5.

Board six was a push board. Board seven saw some action. In the Open Room, Diana opened 1♠, Maxim responded 1Nt and East-West holding 13 and 11 HCP respectively, found no suitable route to get into the auction. 1Nt became the final contract. East led the ♣3 but East-West didn't manage to find their best defence. Two of their Diamond honours crashed in on trick so that contract went two down for 200 to East-West.




In the Closed Room, Boye Brogeland started with a 1Nt opening. Convention Cards are not easily available so we don't have the precise information of what that opening meant. West's 2♣ overcall suggests it is just a suit showing overcall. Once West got into the auction, East had to follow. East-West ended up in 5♣. With wasted Diamond values opposite a stiff Ace, 5♣ had two Spades and one Heart loser. The contract went down one for a score of 100 to North-South. Mavericks got seven more IMPs on the board. Running Scores: Mavericks 29, Diamonds 5.

Team Diamonds earned one IMP on board 8 and lost one on board 9 to make it 30-6. The last board wasn't a push board. On both the tables, the opening was 2♦, a multi showing a weak hand and length in some Major. In the Open Room, Maxim too the scientific route by responding 2Nt. Diana rebid 3♠ to show a weak hand with six Spades and North bowed to the wishes of science, taking the part-score as a fate accompli.





In the Closed room, Piatkov overcalled 3 with his KQJxx holding. Opposite an unpassed partner, that doesn't quite seem like a good idea but then that wasn't the main point in the deal. Keyzad is not the one to believe in too much of science. He chose to bid 4 asking partner to bid his Major suit at a game level, judging, no doubt that West's Club overcall precluded much Club strength with South. That turned out to be a winning bid. was led. Brogeland won A and played a Heart to the Jack. East won,cashed the Ace, and played another Diamond. Brogeland now painstakingly crossruffed his way to 10 tricks. That was a game-swing of 10 IMPs in favour of Mavericks. Final Score: Mavericks 40, Diamonds 6.

In the GOLD category, game was bid and made at twenty nine (29) tables. It went down on a few tables. Very few tables played in a Heart or a Spade partial.

Please also note. There is a Diamond IV team, too, in the GOLD category. Diamond IV is an all-Indian team while the Diamonds team mentioned in this article is an all-foreigners team playing under the World Bridge Federation flag.



GOLD Swiss League Round 5, Team Tolani vs. Deep Finesse

At the end of four rounds, Deep Finesse (Jitu Solani, Rajesh Dalal, Subhash Dhakras, RG Bhiwandkar, Jayendu Patel, and Janak Shah) were in the fifth position with 57.54 VPs while Team Tolani (Shubham Acharya, Arvind Vaidya, R. Venkatesh, and Dr. Mukund Jagannath) was in the sixth with 55.6 VPs. Their match was one of the two on the VU graph for the fifth round.





Board 12, the second board in the session, produced a game swing for Deep Finesse. Playing a strong Club system, Shubham opened $1 \checkmark .2$ was Game-Force. North led the 9. Declarer won in Dummy and played a small Heart to 7 - 7 winning the trick. Declarer, for some reason, tried to enter Dummy for repeating the Heart finesse. Jitu Solani said Thank You and ruffed the Spade. Defenders had three more tricks so the contract went down one.




In the other room, Jayendu Patel opened 1Nt with the West hand. Janak Shah raised to three. North led a Diamond to South's King and South continued Diamonds. Venkatesh let East win the trick. Upon winning, Jayendu finessed Hearts and the trick went $\P7-\P7-\P7-\P7$. With $\P79$ in Dummy, he could afford to go to Dummy and pull one of the two cards to repeat the Heart finesse. He did so and quickly rattled off nine tricks.

This swing could have been avoided in many ways. For one, in the Open Room, East could have raised 2Nt to three instead of bidding 4♥. With a 4333 shape and 14 HCP opposite an opening and a 2Nt rebid, 3Nt had a decent chance. It should rate as being more likely to succeed given the lack of AKA in two minor suits. Secondly, the Declarer in the Open Room must have had a moment of lapse after winning the ♥Queen. If South started with ♥KT8, surely, South would have played the ♥8 first time. The repeated Heart finesse wasn't really needed if you think about it. In the Closed Room, West could afford it because he was in a No-trump contract. In the Open Room, he could ill-afford it as the danger of an adverse ruff lurked in the corner. Deep Finesse earned 10 IMPs on the deal.

Board 15 produced a small swing with both teams producing a result that was much below the Double Dummy Par of the deal. In both the rooms, North opened 1♠ in the third position and East overcalled 2Nt to show both minors. Both South players doubled. The auctions differed after that. Shubham opted to bid 3♠ and got to play there. He got the lead of ♥K. He made no mistake in the play ruffing the lead in the Dummy and beginning with a small Club ruff. He next played a trump to Dummy's Ace. North's King appeared. A Club ruff, ♠K, and another Club ruff followed. He soon claimed 13 tricks, the par on the deal.

In the Closed Room, Jayendu bid $4 \spadesuit$ and Janak Shah raised to five. South chose to double. The . South chose to double. The lead was the same as in the Open Room. Jayendu ruffed, cashed the \clubsuit Ace a questionable move that placed the Declarer in a troublesome position later in the play. A Spade to \spadesuit K and a Club ruff followed, and a Heart ruff and another Club ruff with the \spadesuit Queen came next. There wasn't much difference between the \spadesuit Q and the \spadesuit 8 at this point though. Venkatesh overruffed and played another Heart.

Jayendu ruffed reaching the following position.



South now held more trumps than either of East or West. To score the contract, Jayendu need to use Clubs as trump substitutes to pull one of South's trumps. Jayendu had a decent count of the hand by now, however, he opted to cash a trump. South was now ahead in tempo. South got two more tricks and the contract went down one. Dr. Mukund Jagannath's Venus was in the exalted house today. Team Tolani thus earned seven IMPs on a deal that had much higher potential. The final score of the match was 18-15 in favour of Deep Finesse.
