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### Keyzad Anklesaria and Vidhya Patel Lift the N. K. Gupta Trophy

In a thrilling finish that went right down to the wire, Keyzad Anklesaria and Vidhya Patel captured the N. K. Gupta Trophy for Mixed Pairs, edging past the long-time leaders Pijush Kanti Baroi and Savleen Thadani with a remarkable final-session surge of 37 IMPs. Their total of 85.85 IMPs was just enough to leave their challengers, on 72 IMPs, in second place.

Debabrata Majumder and Kavita Ajmera claimed the third spot, while Subhash Bhavnani and Priya Balasubramanian finished fourth, rounding off a top table that was both competitive and classy.

In the Silver Category, the experienced duo of Sumit Mukherjee and Monica Jajoo stamped their authority in emphatic style. Their tally of 133.6 IMPs placed them almost 50 IMPs clear of their nearest rivals, Bhaskar Sarkar and Bindiya Judge. Anna Gulevich and Andrey Gromov were close behind in third with 90.4 IMPs, followed by Sandeep and Marianne Karmarkar in fourth on 55.8 IMPs.

The Mixed IMP Pairs Strata was a close affair, with Usha Kabra and Gopinath Manna prevailing narrowly on 80.5 IMPs, just ahead of Sarika Mittal and Rajendra Sirohia on 79 IMPs. Bijal Shah and Ranjan Bose secured third with 72.8 IMPs, and Shambhu Nath Ghosh and Jesal Dabriwala completed the leading quartet with 59.6 IMPs.

The evening concluded on a gracious note, as Mrs. Kiran Nadar presented the prizes—her presence adding an extra touch of elegance to an already memorable event.



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### **Monday Fireworks**


The Mixed Pairs elimination began with a Slam. In the Open Room on the Vu graph, Subhash Gupta-Puja Batra were playing against Keyzad Anklesaria and Vidhya Patel. Vidhya held the blockbuster 20 HCP East hand. She opened a strong 1 - 4 and launched into a Roman Key Card Blackwood after finding the Spade fit. Keyzad showed 1 Key Card with his 4 - 4 response and Subhash Gupta doubled for lead. With a stiff Club, Vidhya wasn't worried about the Club suit. She proceeded with the King ask 4 - 4 holding the trump Queen (4 - 4), Keyzad showed his 4 - 4 king by bidding 4 - 4 and Vidhya finished the auction with a 4 - 4 bid.



Move the minor suit honours slightly, give West  $\clubsuit$ K and  $\blacklozenge$ J, North,  $\clubsuit$ AQ, and South, the  $\blacklozenge$ K, the bidding would have been the same till the  $5 \spadesuit$  asking bid and the slam would have failed. As the cards are, the Stiff Club in the East hand is opposite  $\clubsuit$ Jx, so the West hand has no wasted values. Still, nothing succeeds like success. Keyzad Anklesaria-Vidhya Patel began with a bang.

Twenty-two Pairs bid the Spade slam, seven preferred 6♥, and one Pair successfully tried 6Nt. Keyzad-Vidhya earned four IMPs for that effort.

In the 'Closed Room' on the Vu Graph, South pre-empted 3♣ on East's 1♠ opening. East-West failed to bid the game. The stored Vu Graph record of a Pair Table ends up saving the name of four players who played the last two boards on that table. It does not give us the names of pairs who played the first round, or for that matter, any earlier rounds. Let us leave the discussion of board one here.



The next slammish board of Monday was board number 6. In the 'Open Room' of the Vu Graph, East, Deepika Mehta opened 1♣, West responded 1♥, and Subhash Gupta jumped to 3♣. Note that the opening bid stole North's


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Club suit, so a mere 2♣ bid wouldn't have got the Club suit across. That is why, with a 5-loser hand of 12 HCPs, we see a 3♣ bid that might appear as if it is a pre-emptive bid but is not quite so.


Deepika now bid 3♥ to show 4-card support to responder's suit and West jumped to 4Nt to ask Aces. It seems that East-West neither had an exclusion asking bid in their armoury nor did they have RKC. The 5♦ response showed one Ace. That clearly wasn't enough for West to bid a slam. West subsided in 5♥. In the 'Closed Room', East-West reached 6♥ and went down two. Trumps are 4-0 and both the pointed suits break 4-2. Double Dummy, the slam has a play, but single Dummy, it is difficult to find a reasonable line especially because South holds ♥9642, ♥9 being higher than East's second Heart. Only five Pairs were able to bid and make the 6 slam. They were P Narayan lyer-Aparajitha lyer, Sujata Puranik Rakhra-Kunal Jaiswal, Alka Jain-Tarun Singhal, Nikita Kamal-Arun Kumar Sinha, and Reena Pal-Arya Chakraborty. They earned 14 IMPs for their effort.

Those who did not bid a slam lost four IMPs while those who bid and went down lost 12 IMPs. The key takeaway from this board is this: It is best to take a conservative view when one opponent pre-empts at a 3 level or higher simply because bad breaks are a little more likely.

The next board in the slam zone was board eight. Diamond King is sitting under the ♦ Ace so there is no way to make 12 tricks without help from North-South. Still, if East-West manage to bid the slam from West hand and North opts to lead the ♦ Ace, twelve tricks can be easily made. Two pairs, Ratna Tadepalli-Christian Bakke and Ramaratnam Venkatesh-Anjali Karthikeyan scored 980. West conducted 6♥ in both cases.



Board 10 brought up another slam. Puja Batra Opened 1 ♦ in the second seat and rebid 2 ♣ on Subhash Gupta's 1 ♠. The opening itself was enough for Subhash to bid a slam. He waited to hear the rebid just to make sure partner didn't hold extra values. Once the 2 ♣ rebid limited South hand, Subhash jumped to 6Nt.



Deepika Nagpal led the ♥6. Subhash won ♥A in the Closed hand and finished Diamonds starting with ♦Ace and ♦King. On the last two Diamonds, West discarded two Clubs. Subhash now cashed the ♣A. When ♣J fell on the


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first round, he claimed 12 tricks. 6Nt bid and made was worth seven IMPs. Twenty six pairs bid 6Nt whereas five settled in  $6 \spadesuit$ . Some Pairs also ended up in  $6 \spadesuit$  no doubt due to some misunder-standing.



Deepika Mehta and Rohit Gupta


The second session brough up boards that did not have slam written on any of them anywhere. Board 29 in the third session brought up a Diamond slam. Subhash Bhavanani and Priya Balasubramanian found a neat strong-Club bidding sequence to get there. Subhash opened a strong 1♣. Priya responded 1♦ showing 0 to 7 HCP or so and Subhash rebid 1♥. After two rounds of natural bidding, they found the Diamond fit. Subhash's 4♦ was 'Minorwood', asking for Key Cards with Diamonds as trumps. Priya showed 1 key card with her 4♠ reply. That was the ♦ King. That was all Subhash needed for the slam. He tabled the 6♦ bid. South became the Declarer because of the initial 1♦ bid that was merely an HCP-counting bid. West led a Spade. Twelve tricks sailed. The score of +1370 to North-South was worth eleven IMPs. Only 11 tables managed to get there. Twelve tricks were also available in Hearts, but those depended on a successful Heart finesse. In the 'Closed Room' of the Vu Graph, too, North-South were playing a strong Club system. North jumped to 2♥ on the 1♦ response and jumped to 4♥ again after seeing a 3♣ rebid by South. The Diamond suit never got mentioned. North-South lost just five IMPs for failing to bid a slam. That should tellyou about the relative difficulty of bidding the slam.



Subhash Bhavnani and Priya Balasubramanian bid yet another slam in the third session. That was against Vijay Singh and Pushpa Puri on board 33.Yet again, it was a strong club bidding sequence. The only difference this time was that the response to the 1♣ opening was a positive one. Priya's 2♣ response showed 8+ HCP and Club suit.

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Roman Key Card asking bid.  $4 \checkmark$  showed 0 or 3. North has  $\triangle A$ ,  $\triangle A$ , and  $\triangle King$ , note.  $4 \triangle A$  was primarily asking for trump Queen and 4Nt denied  $\triangle A$ Queen. Priya Balsubramanian now settled for a small slam. On Board 29 earlier, Priya got to play the  $6 \spadesuit A$  contract although partner had longer Diamonds. On the present board, she had the length in Clubs, but owing to the strong  $1 \clubsuit A$  opening, North got to play the  $6 \clubsuit A$  contract.





East led the ♠9. There was nothing to play. Subhash Bhavnani guessed the Trumps right and made 13 tricks. That earned them just five IMPs though. A majority of East-West Pairs bid the slam.





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# Keyzad Anklesaria-Vidhya Patel make +37 in the final set and lift the NK Gupta trophy

The fifth and the last session of the Mixed Pairs final started with Pijush Kanti Baroi and Savleen Thadani at the top with 81 IMPs. Keyzad Anklesaria-Vidhya Patel were second with 48.85 IMPs.



On Board 42, the second board of the set, they were East-West. Bhavna opened 1♥ in the South seat, Pijush overcalled 1Nt holding 16 HCP and Lalit raised to two. Now, with 5620 distribution and a 5-loser hand, Bhavna did not try for a game. 2♥ was the final contract. Pijush led a top Diamond but switched to a Club at trick two. Bhavna discarded a Diamond, cashed top Spades, ruffed a Spade, ruffed a Diamond, and ran a small trump to East's Jack. East Played a Spade. West ruffed, overruffed in Dummy. Declarer had enough trumps to get back to the Closed hand, remove West's last trump and claim 11 tricks. Only five out of 13 North-South Pairs reached the good 4♥ game on this board. Keyzad-Vidhya pair was one of them.


On Board 42, Pijush-Savleen got four IMPs while board 41 was a push board for them. Keyzad-Vidhya lost an IMP on board 41 but gained 8 IMPs when they bid and made 4♥ on board 42. After 42 boards, Pijush Kanti Baroi and Savleen Thadani were still in the lead with a score of +85 IMPs well clear of the second placed Keyzad Anklesaria and Vidhya Patel who were on 55.85 IMPs. P. Sridharan and Uma Rajesh were third with 53.13 IMPs. The rest of the pairs were below 50 IMPs.

In the second round of the fifth session, Christian Bakke-Ratna Tadepalli were North-South while Abhijit Pal – Kamna Sharma were East-West. On Board 43, the first board of the round, the fate of the 3Nt contract depended on which side it was played from. Abhijit Pal opened 1Nt and became the Declarer. Bakke led a small Spade. With the ♠Q trick in the bag, Abhijit had nine easy tricks with four Hearts, two Spades, and three Clubs. He scored 400 for East-West.




Pijush Kanti Baroi and Savleen Thadani


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In the other room, 3Nt was played from the East side. Diana Rakhmani opened 1♣ and jumped to 3♣ on Maxim Semisochenko's 1♥ response. Maxim now bid 3Nt. South led the ♥3. Without the benefit of the ♠Queen trick, the Declarer was reduced to guessing Clubs. Both ♠Q and ♦K were badly placed for the Declarer. He had to get Clubs right. At the table, Maxim won the ♥A and played the Clubs off the top. He could make only eight tricks. North-South scored +50 and earned 10 IMPs.



Board 44 had a slam written on it. West held 19 HCP opposite East's 15. Abhijit Pal started with a 1 ♦ opening and splintered to 4 ♣ on the 1 ♠ showing four Spades and short Clubs. Kamna Sharma now cuebid 4 ♥. Abhijit Pal used the RKC, got a 5 ♠ response that showed trump queen and two Key Cards. On the 5Nt King ask, Kamna bid 6 ♣ denying a King. Abhijit next bid a slightly hopeful 7 ♠. Kamna came up with the ♦ Q so there was no difficulty whatsoever in making 13 tricks. The lead was a trump. Kamna removed trumps in three rounds, cashed all the red suit winners, cashed the ♣ Ace, ruffed a Club, and then claimed. On the other table on Vu graph, Maxim Savisochenko and Diana Rakhmani also reached 7 ♠ after a 1 ♣ opening and a somewhat coded bidding sequence. Uttam Gupta and Vasanti Shah were East-West.




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Pijush Kanti Baroi and Savleen Thadani played boards 43 and 44 against Keyzad Anklesaria-Vidhya Patel. They failed to bid 7♠ on Board 44. They did bid 6♠ but lost five IMPs on the board. They could have won 8 if they had bid and made seven Spades. On Board 43, Keyzad-Vidhya made 3Nt playing from the West side. That earned them one IMP. At the end of 44 boards, Pijush-Savleen wereon +79 IMPs while Keyzad-Vidhya were on 61.85.

Keyzad Anklesaria-Vidhya Patel played the next round against Hema Deora-Abhijit Chakraborty while Pijush-Savleen played against Diana Rakhmani-Maxim Savisochenko. For Pijush-Savleen, the round was uneventful. Opponents made 2♠ on board 45 and 4♠ on board 46. Both were push boards.

Keyzad-Vidhya got a bonanza on board 45. They were North-South. They played in 2♠ as most other NS pairs – totally nine out of 13 Pairs - did, however, they were doubled. 2S doubled and made for a score of +670 got them eleven golden IMPs. Board 46 was a push. At the end of 46 boards, with two rounds to go, Pijush-Savleen were on +79 IMPs while Keyzad-Vidhya were on 72.85.




In the next round, on Board 48, Pijush Kanti Baroi and Savleen Thadani got into some trouble. Abhijit Pal dealt and opened weak 2 ♠. Pijush doubled, and doubled again in the reopening position when Kamna's 3 ♠ raise was passed to him. The North hand doesn't have a great shape here nor does it have crisp honours. The ♠Q is wasted and the Kings in the rounded suits could well be less useful than the HCP count suggests. Anyway, Savleen seems to have given much more value to the North hand when she chose to bid 4 ♠ rather than just bid 3 ♥ or 3 ♠ with her weak hand. Pijush now bid 4 ♥ and played there. Luckily for North-South, Kamna did not double 4 ♥. It went down four for -200 to North-South. East-West had a Diamond partial going for them so the -200 score did not translate to too much of an IMP loss. They just lost one IMP on the board. They lost one more on Board 47. Their tally, at the end of 48 boards, was +77.

Playing in Diamonds, 10 tricks were easily available for the East-West, and eleventh could be made on a Double-Dummy basis. Say North leads a top Spade and shifts to the ♣King. Declarer can win, finesse Hearts, ruff a Heart, play a Diamond finessing against North's Queen, ruff the fourth Heart with the ♦Ace, and enter Dummy with the ♦King to discard a Club on the fifth Heart.

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Keyzad-Vidhya collected four IMPs on board 47 by defending a 1Nt contract well. The 1Nt contract made on seven tables and went down one on three. Keyzad-Vidhya managed to get a par on the board by defeating the contract by two tricks. That earned them four IMPs. Board 48 was a push board for them. With one round to go, Pijush Kanti Baroi and Savleen Thadani were on +77 while Keyzad-Vidhya were on 76.85. A thin fraction of an IMP separated them but the momentum was with Keyzad Anklesaria-Vidhya Patel.



Pijush-Savleen continued to lose IMPs in a trickle even on the last round. They lost one on Board 49 and four more on Board 50 to finish with a score of +72 IMPs. Board 49 was a flattish board on which East-West had 24 HCP combined holding and a 6-2 Heart fit. Seven tables bid to ⁴♥ and went down either one or two. Three bid to 3Nt and went down. Only three East-West pairs manage to stay out of a game. One of them made nine tricks, the other

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two failed. This was another uneventful board. Still, Keyzad-Vidhya earned +1 IMP on it while Pijush-Savleen lost one. At the end of board 49, the leadership position had flipped. Keyzad-Vidhya led the field with a score of 77.85 while Pijush-Savleen were on +76.



The last board only served to extend that lead. This was board 50 of the final session. The vulnerability is that of board 18. The recount begins on board number 33 in this scheme of things. Both 4♥ and 4♠ games are makeable for East-West. In fact, 4♠ made on three tables while 4♥ scored on two. The game did go down on four tables. Keyzad-Vidhya's table was one of them. Their opponents bid 4♠ and went down one. That gave Keyzad-Vidhya 8 IMPs and an unassailable lead. Pijush-Savleen's opponents Nikita Kamal and Arun Sinha scored a game against them on board 48, so Pijush-Savleen lost four IMPs. In addition, they lost one on board 47. Final position: Pijush-Savleen+72 IMPs; Keyzad-Vidhya: 85.85.
