OLIMP score over Shourie; Monica Jajoo edge past Mavericks

The Quarter-Finals of the 22nd HCL International Bridge Championship produced their fair share of drama, tension, and brilliance. In the GOLD category, two matches went right down to the wire, keeping spectators on the edge of their seats.

OLIMP began their match against **Shourie** in dazzling form, storming through the first set 61–2. But Shourie, never a side to wilt under pressure, clawed back magnificently in the third set to erase most of that lead. The final stanza featured a flurry of fascinating boards—two of which are covered in this bulletin. In the end, OLIMP held their nerve to prevail by 138–134, and book their spot in the semifinals.

WHAM and Dhampur Sugar Mills were evenly poised after two sets, but from there, the defending champions clicked into overdrive. A commanding performance in the final two sets saw **WHAM** pull clear for a **182–87** victory.

EA Bridge displayed trademark control in their **124–89** win over **Texan Aces**, never letting the match slip out of their grasp. The duel between Mavericks and Monica Jajoo was the thriller of the round, with fortunes swinging from board to board. In the end, Monica Jajoo edged home by the slimmest of margins—**112.33–110**—on the very last deal.

In the **SILVER** category, **Nagpur VI** overcame **Ranjan** 106–102 in a contest that stayed close throughout. Ashok Bedi outclassed Chefs Table 162–117, Hyderabad Blues dominated Gladiators 129–70, and **ERNIS** swept past **Team Kabra** 149–89 to complete the semifinal lineup.

Meanwhile, in the Matchpoint Pairs, Wojciech Gawel and Piotr Marcinowski continued their fine run, topping the second elimination with 64.91%. Boguslaw Gierulski-Jerzy Skrzypczak (64.21%) and Rajeshwar Tewari–Sumit Mukherjee (63.5%) followed close behind. The third elimination will be played tomorrow.

In the MP Strata Pairs, Kamal Mukherjee-Alok Daga (65.23%) led the field, ahead of M. K. Halder -**Amitava Banerjee (61.78%)**, who took the runner-up spot.

The championship now enters its defining phase. The margins have narrowed, the tension has risen—and as every player knows, from here on, every card will count.

Atmanirbhar Monica Jajoo team through to the Semi-Finals

Two Quarter-Final matches in the GOLD category went to the wire. We have covered part of the OLIMP vs Shourie match in a separate article. OLIMP won 138-134. Monica Jajoo team (Monica Jajoo, Sukamal Das, Binod Shaw, Sanjit Dey, Kaustubh Bendre, and Sayanta Kushari) vs. Mavericks (NPC Anal Shah, Subodh Maskara, Boye Brogeland, Keyzad Anklesaria, Ami Zamir, Oren Toledano, and Aniruddha Bhattacharya) was the other.

Monica Jajoo trailed Mavericks 87.33-90 at the end of the third set. Mavericks added a big chunk to that slender lead when Sanjit-Binod failed to bid 7♥ on Board 15. In the Closed room, Toledano's 6♣ reply seems to have shown a Club void with two Key Cards. That was all West needed for a Grand Slam after a ♥ fit was found.





Binod's 3♠ bid seems to be a proxy for a splinter in Clubs. Either that, or it showed some short suit that Sanjit did not care to find out about. Furthermore, the reply to 4Nt did not unearth the void Club. Sanjit signed off in 6♥. Monica Jajoo team lost 11 IMPs.

They recovered all those 11 IMPs in the next two boards. Next board featured a 1-level contract in both the rooms. Card play and defence alone caused a swing. In the Open Room, \checkmark 2 was led against Sanjit's 1Nt. Dummy played small. Boye, judging to place the \checkmark T with North, decided to flout the 'third hand highest' rule and played the \checkmark 9. Sanjit won, conceded a small Diamond, and easily scored seven tricks for +90.

In the Closed Room, Sayantan doubled, Kaustubh Bendre took out to 1♠ and played there. West cashed top Diamonds and played a third Diamond for East to ruff. Toledano had to choose his next play between the black suits. A trump would have been harmless for the defence. A Club seemed superficially harmless, but it weakened defenders' Club suit from a pre-frozen state to a frozen suit. The trick went ♣7-♣5-♣A-♣4. Ami Zamir how switched to a trump. Kaustubh Bendre drew three rounds of trumps and played a Heart to ♥King. Toledano won ♥A and played a small Heart. Kaustubh won and endplayed Toledano in the following position.



Toledano had to open the Club suit and allow Kaustubh to finesse against his ♣Ten. Kaustubh made last two tricks for +80 to North-South. Add the 90 from the Open Room. Monica Jajoo won five IMPs on that board.


On Board 17, Keyzad-Boye overshot to $4 \checkmark$. Boye opened $1 \clubsuit$ in the third seat, Keyzad showed Hearts with his $1 \spadesuit$ response, Binod now chipped in with a $1 \spadesuit$ overcall, and Boye doubled to show three Hearts, a la support double. Sanjit bid $2 \checkmark$ to show a top-of-the-range passed hand and good Spade support. Keyzad doubled to show good Hearts and Binod retreated to $2 \spadesuit$. That was the limit of the hand. For some reason, Boye pressed on with a $3 \clubsuit$ bid holding five Clubs without any of the three top honours. He did pass Keyzad's $3 \checkmark$, but they couldn't let $3 \spadesuit$ stand.



Keyzad bid 4 - 0 on 3 - 0 and North-South ended up in 4 - 0. Sanjit doubled. (The last round is not visible in the main box that shows the bidding. It is attached as an extra to the diagram.)

4♥ went down two for 300 to East-West. In the Closed Room the bidding was crisp and the contract was an undoubled 3♥ going one down. Monica Jajoo earned six IMPs on the board. The scores, at the end of Board 17, were Monica Jajoo: 98.33, Mavericks: 101.




The next scores, in IMP terms, were 0,0,1,3,-2,0,0,0 from Maverick's point of view. At the end of Board 25, the scores were Monica Jajoo:100.33, Mavericks: 105. Board 26 produced a swing that turned the match. The bidding was routine. Sanjit bid 4♠ after finding the 5-3 Spade fit via a checkback 2♦ bid. Keyzad led a small Heart. Sanjit played small from Dummy. Boye won and tabled the ♦ Ace, perhaps, in a moment of lapse. The contract was cold after that.




In the Closed Room, Kaustubh Bendre employed a technique perfected by Thorale Bajirao, the famous warrior of Pune who never lost a battle. He often severed enemy's supply lines if the enemy was well-ensconced in a place and too strong to tackle directly. The contract was the same as in the Open Room. Sayantan also led a small Heart. Kaustubh won and returned a Heart. Zamir won in Dummy and played a Spade to the ♠Queen. He needed to play Spades from Dummy once more. He made the mistake of using the ♣King entry for that play.

This was the situation when Kaustubh Bendre was on play. With the Diamond King sitting under AQ, Declarer needed the 13th Heart to provide him the tenth trick, but Kaustubh proceeded to cut his supply line to that fourth Heart by firing a Heart while Kaustubh still held a trump. Toledano had to surrender. Down one was the result. Monica Jajoo earned 12 vital IMPs on the deal. Monica Jajoo now led 112.33 to Mavericks' 105.




Mavericks pulled back five IMPs on the next deal, but they couldn't get any more on Board 28, the last deal of the set. Atmanirbhar team Monica Jajoo made it to the semi-finals with a neat win (112.33-110) over Mavericks.


Elopement play: a lost Opportunity

Try this Dummy play problem. At favourable vulnerability, East opens $1 \, \stackrel{\checkmark}{\bullet}$ in the second seat, West responds 1Nt, and East rebids $2 \, \stackrel{\blacktriangle}{\bullet}$. West now signs-off in $2 \, \stackrel{\blacktriangledown}{\bullet}$. The auction was natural after that bid. East leads the $\stackrel{\blacktriangledown}{\bullet}$ A and switches to a trump. The second trick goes $\frac{\blacktriangle}{\bullet}5 - \frac{\blacktriangle}{\bullet}2 - \frac{\blacktriangle}{\bullet}6 - \frac{\blacktriangle}{\bullet}7$. You ruff a small Club and cash the $\stackrel{\blacktriangledown}{\bullet}$ King discarding a Heart from the Closed hand. East discards a Club, the $\frac{\clubsuit}{\bullet}4$. Take it from there. The clue is in the title in case you need one.



You have made three out of four tricks, you need seven more. You have six trumps left, four in the Closed hand and two in Dummy, and there is the ♥A in Dummy. Furthermore, you know East does not have any more trump. If he had one, he would have ruffed the ♦ King.

Here is how you can go about it. Ruff a Diamond, ruff a small Club, ruff another Diamond, and ruff another small Club, this time, with the ♠ King. Ruff a Diamond next, and then cash ♥A, and play any red suit card. You will score your last trump En passant. This was the full hand.



At the Table, Koushik began very well when he ruffed a small club at trick three, however, at the next turn, he couldn't resist the temptation of cashing the \triangle Ace. After that, West's \triangle AT were in a promotable position in a sense. After the \triangle A, if the Declarer ruffs a Club with \triangle K, West will just discard and the Declarer won't be able to ruff another Club. If the Declarer ruffs small, West will overruff and cash \triangle A.

Declarer next played a Heart to ♥A and ruffed a Heart. When he ruffed a Club with ♠K on the next trick, Anand Samant overruffed and played the ♠T to remove Dummy's trump. Declarer lost two Club tricks in the end.

This was Board 21 in the quarter-final match between Texan Aces and EA Bridge.

Quarter-Final, Set 1: WHAM vs. Dhampur Sugar Mills

The Quarter finals of the 22nd HCL International Bridge Championship got underway on Saturday, 11th October 2025 morning. In GOLD and SILVER category, 16 top teams each qualified for the knockout rounds, 8 of them won their first KO round to reach the Quarter-Finals. In the GOLD category, OLIMP, Shourie, WHAM, Dhampur Sugar Mills, EA Bridge, Texan Aces, Mavericks, and Monica Jajoo won their PreQF matches.


For the first session of the Quarter-Finals, the two matches on the Vu Graph were OLIMP vs Shourie and Dhampur Sugar Mills vs. WHAM. The first session of the OLIMP-Shourie match was a one-sided session that OLIMP won 61-2.

The Dhampur Sugar Mills (Ashok Kumar Goyal, K R Venkataraman, Ajay Khare, Arun Bapat, Raju Tolani, and Vinay Desai) vs WHAM(Sartaj Hans, Andy Hung, Michael Whibley, and Matthew Brown) match turned out to be a close one. In this article, we will cover the second match and refer to the first match for some board results.

Board one was a flat board in the WHAM-Dhampur Sugar Mills match. Both North-South Pairs reached a game and made 12 tricks, one in $4 \, \frac{1}{2} \,$



In the OLIMP-Shourie match, Andrey Gromov saw an opportunity when West doubled a 3♣ bid for Club lead. Examine the bidding on their table. On hearing the double, Gromov upgraded his hand counting two Club tricks for




his AKJ6 holding. East obediently led AS and Gromov soon rattled off 12 tricks. This was a classic case of using opponent's bid as a stepping stone to visualising a higher contract. Bridge players are aware of the concept of a 'stepping stone' play wherein you take the help of one of the opponents to reach a hand, most often the Dummy, that does not have an entry. You take help of opponents to reach an otherwise unreachable place. Without West telling North-South that he held Club honours, the slam is simply not visualisable. With the benefit of the information provided by the double of A, one could begin to think about it.

As the cards are, 6Nt is not the best contract. It will go down on a Diamond lead. Could East have found a Diamond lead? Well, what if West doubles 6Nt to tell partner to 'forget all about his earlier double and think afresh?'. Perhaps, that kind of a double will become commonplace in 2040s. For now, everyone passed 6Nt, East led a Club as guided and the slam sailed. Well-bid Andrey Gromov!

First five boards in the WHAM-Dhampur Sugar Mills match were tame affairs. After scores of 0,1, 0, 3, 0, WHAM were leading 4-0 at the end of board five. Board 6 produced the first big swing.



Ajay Khare passed in the second position but came in with a 3 ♦ jump in the reopening position at his next turn after Brown opened 1 ♠ and North and East passed. Matthew Brown doubles for take-out. With a 1-3-5-4 shape and just three courtiers, Whibley didn't want to risk a three level bid. He passed, taking the best of a few bad options. Ajay Khare won the ♠ K lead, ran the ♦ Ten, repeated the Diamond finesse, rattled off trumps, and played a Spade. In due course, he claimed nine tricks and +470 score.

In the other room, Sartaj opened 1 ♦. By the time East was forced to get into the auction, Venky had already doubled twice, South had made two bids of Diamond suit, and the biding had still not crossed the two level. Ashok Goyal could afford to bid 3♣. Sartaj bid 3♦ and played there.



Sartaj also got ♣King lead. He ducked, won ♣A, ruffed a Club, cashed a top Diamond to discover the bad break and then played a Spade. Trumps had not been removed at this stage. Venky won ♠A, switched to ♥K, and continued Hearts when Sartaj ducked. Sartaj won and tried to cash the ♠K. East ruffed and cashed a Heart. Sartaj lost one more trick to the Jack of Diamonds. Down two was the result. Dhampur Sugar Mills won 11 IMPs on the board.

WHAM pulled back some IMPs on the next board. Arun Bapat's 2♥ raise seems a little heavy. He conveyed as much at his second turn with a redouble. That was enough excuse for Ajay Khare to bid a game. Double Dummy, 10 tricks were available. Single Dummy, Declarer had to guess the Diamond Queen. Ajay Khare won the opening lead and played a Diamond to Jack losing to East's Queen. The contract had faltered at the first hurdle. Down one was the result.



Examine the bidding of Matthew Brown. The 1♠ overcall itself was light and he followed it up with a double in the reopening position. Luckily for him, partner came up with ♠T98 and North-South Spades were divided 3-2. Even then, East-West had only six tricks available to them. It seems like a rather risky double, but it fetched six IMPs for his team in the end.

In the Other Room, Sartaj opened 1Nt with the South hand. With five decent Hearts, AKK in side suits, perhaps, opening 1Nt jeopardises many good $2 \checkmark$ or $3 \checkmark$ spots, but much depends on what your other options are in the system. Anyway, Sartaj eventually became the Declarer in 2Nt.



Venky led the \triangle Q. Ashok Goyal played \triangle T. Venky continued with a small Spade. Sartaj won \triangle K and played a small Heart to \P T and Venky's Queen. Venky now cashed all his Spades. In doing so, he forced partner to find some awkward discards. Perhaps a Club back after \P Q might have given the Declarer some opportunity to go down. On the fourth and fifth Spade, Ashok discarded a Club and a Heart. Sartaj was spared a Diamond guess. He scored three Hearts, two each in minor suits, and \triangle K. Eight tricks for +120. WHAM won six IMPs on the board.

Board 10 provided a lucky game swing to WHAM. In one Room, 5-card Spade holder was on lead, in the other, the Opening leader had four in each Major and a Heart lead was far more attractive. WHAM picked up 13 IMPs on board. This board is fit for an entry in the 'Challenge the Champs' bidding competition in Bridge World. The best contract for North-South is 5 in a 6-4 fit. Had one of the teams reached that with conviction, that would have been a meritorious gain. The present type of swing often skews the result of short matches. In a 56-board match, the expectation is that the luck would even out.





WHAM scored an IMP on board 11. Two flat boards followed. Board 14 produced the final big swing of the set. First two bids were the same in both the rooms. East opened 1 ♦ and South overcalled 2Nt to show Clubs and Hearts. In the Closed Room, Matthew Brown tabled a slightly daring 3 ♦ bid. Arun Bapat forced with 4 ♦. Whibley passed (?) allowing Ajay Khare to make a 4 € cue-bid and Arun Bapat to employ an RKC. The question was, RKC for which suit? For Hearts or Clubs? It seems that Ajay Khare solved that problem by showing simple Aces with his 5 ♥ bid. He didn't seem to have counted ♥Q as trump queen. Arun Bapat had five Hearts, so he didn't need the ♥Q anyway. He bid 6 ♥. North-South got 980 for that effort.

In the Open Room, Venky did not venture a $3 \diamondsuit$ bid so Hung could cue-bid $3 \diamondsuit$. Ashok doubled to show Diamond suit and Venky now jumped to $5 \diamondsuit$. That robbed the 4Nt bid from the space that was available to North-South. In absence of a check on Aces, Hung took a conservative view and settled in $5 \heartsuit$. That was 480 to NS. Dhampur Sugar Mills earned 11 IMPs on that board.





Quarter-Final: OLIMP vs. Shourie, Set 4

At the end of three sets, OLIMP led Shourie by a solitary IMP. That was after they blitzed Shourie 61-2 in the first set and were return-blitzed 4-63 in the third set. The second set was a tame 28-27 IMP in their favour.

The fourth set produced some blockbusters. It began with a Grand Slam. Anna Gulevich deal and opened 3♣ at unfavourable vulnerability, Dror Padon jump-overcalled to 4♥ and Birman came up with a 6♣ bid, no doubt showing a massive hand with Club void. Padon now bid 7♥. Surely, the 6♣ bid couldn't have come without two Aces, Club void, and a Heart fit. That was definitely a brilliant bid.




In the Close Room, the OLIMP East-West had a free uncontested run but they didn't manage to get to 7♥. Sometimes, science doesn't quite give the best results. On this deal, it seems that the mention of Club suit by West must have put off East. It is difficult to offer any more comment on the bidding especially when none of the bid is shown as an artificial bid in the Vu graph records. The end result was that OLIMP lost eleven IMPS, and were, for the first time perhaps, trailing their opponents.



Board 18 produced the next big swing. The bidding is straightforward in both the rooms. There is a bit of point counting Open Room starting with a strong 1& while the Closed Room started with a strong 1Nt Opening. Both Norths showed the Club suit albeit through different mechanisms. Both Pairs checked on Aces and settled in a small slam. Andrey Gromov and Anna Gulevich rightly opted for 6Nt. In the Closed Room, Christian Bakke and Tor Grude bid 6. It is hard to see the benefit of playing in the Club suit where it is the shortest suit in the South hand. South could definitely have converted to 6Nt, we feel. Anyway, Orlov led his singleton Heart against 6. and received a Heart ruff in due course. Team OLIMP won 17 IMPs on the board.





After an exciting 4th set of 14 boards, OLIMP won the match with an overall tally of 138-134 IMPs.
