WHAM retain the Naresh Tandan Trophy

GOLD MP PAIRS WINNER

WHAM — the formidable quartet of Sartaj Hans, Andy Hung, Michael Whibley, and Matthew Brown from Australia and New Zealand — retained the **Naresh Tandan Trophy**, winning the GOLD category final of the 22nd HCL International Bridge Championship with a **178–148 IMP** victory over **OLIMP** (Andrey Gromov, Anna Gulevich, Sergey Orlov, Evgeny Rudakov, and Olga Firsova).

They seized control early, leading 53–18 after the first set, and though OLIMP briefly closed the gap to under 20 IMPs midway through the last set, WHAM quickly reasserted themselves. Their precise cardplay and disciplined, clockwork-like bidding stood out through diverse situations. In the end, their triumph had an air of inevitability—a deserved second consecutive lift of the Naresh Tandan Trophy.

In the playoff for third place, **EA Bridge** led **Monica Jajoo** 107–50 after two sessions when they received a walkover.

In the **SILVER Teams** final, **Nagpur VI** swept past **Hyderabad Blue** 159–60 after three sessions to claim the **Mohini Tandan Trophy**; Hyderabad Blue conceded the match at that point. In the playoff for third, **ERNIS** led **Ashok Bedi** 115–66.5 after three sets when they, too, received a walkover.

The GOLD MP Pairs final saw Christian Bakke and Tor Eivind Grude claim the Neena Bonarji Trophy with 896.92 Matchpoints. Subhash Gupta – Sandeep Thakral finished second on 877.09, while Diego Brenner – Paul D. Hackett (823.25) and Oren Toledano – Ami Zamir (822.68) followed close behind.

In the **SILVER MP Pairs**, **Vinay Desai – Raju Tolani** edged out **R.G. Bhiwandkar – Subhash Dhakras** with 691.9 against 691.52.

The **IMP Pairs** final was won by **Tatiana Nokhacheva – Aleksandr Piatkov** with +117 IMPs, while **Saptarshi Chanda – Animesh Majumder** were runners-up with +85.2.

Gaurav Rajwade – Rajendra Mekal captured the IMP Pairs Strata title with +101 IMPs.





GOLD Final: Set 4

With eight boards to go, WHAM were leading OLIMP163-115. On Board 21, Whibley overcalled Gromov's strong 1♣ opening. He had only 4 HCP and a semi-Balanced hand, but he chose to overcall 1♠ holding 5 Spades. Matthew Brown also held 5 Spades. They were fresh opposite vulnerable. Brown barraged with 4♠. Gromov passed, but Anna doubled in the reopening position. Gromov happily passed. There were seven top losers in the side suits and the ♠ King was off, so North-South collected 1100 against a vulnerable game.



Hung – Hans duly bid that game and scored 660 when the ♣Queen came down in two rounds. WHAM lost 10 IMPs for trying to clobber a strong Club opening.



On Board 23, in the Open Room, East-West played a tepid 2♠ contract after they weren't challenged in the auction.



In the Closed Room, Sartaj decided to double 2♠ raise. He had passed fir time and he had a decent shape, so there wasn't much risk in the double, he must have thought. He hadn't reckoned with the match situation wherein opponents were down by a few dozens of IMPs and were willing to take risk. Orlov redoubled to show a decent hand and Rudakov doubled 3♦ in anticipation of a juicy penalty. Yet again, both the WHAM players held a semi-Balanced hand and the Declarer had little elbow room.



Rudakov lead the ♠K. Orlov promptly overtook with ♠A and tabled the ♠King. He must be playing a lot of robot Bridge wherein a singleton honour sitting over the Dummy often crashes with partner's honour. The robots don't have enough patience to wait for their tricks. The moment Declarer plays a card from the Closed hand and the robot sees and opportunity to win a trick, the robot tries to win that trick. Anyway. Declarer won the ♦A and played another trump. Rudakov won and attacked Clubs the first thing. Declarer didn't have enough tempo for discarding a losing Club on Dummy's fourth Heart. Down three and 800 to East-West was the result. OLIMP won twelve IMPs on the board.

OLIMP won 8 more IMPs on the next board but WHAM sealed their victory on Board twenty six with a 13-IMP pickup when Gromov-Anna Gulevich played in 4Nt, a decent contract, but went down because Anna mis-guessed Diamonds to go down. In the other room, Declarer made 12 tricks playing in 3Nt. OLIMP won the 56-board final 178-148.




Gold Final Set 2

In the GOLD category final of the 22nd HCL International Bridge Championship, Set 2. OLIMP (Andrey Gromov, Anna Gulevich, Sergey Orlov, Evgeny Rudakov, Olga Firsova) playing against WHAM (Sartaj Hans, Andy Pie-en Hung, Matthew Brown, Michael Whibley) were down 21-53 at the end of the first session. Were they going to play a steady game or were they going to try for swings? The first deal might give us some clue.

Anna Gulevich opened 2♠, weak, in the dealer position, and Matthew Brown overcalled 2Nt. With seven good High Card Points and a 6-card Diamond suit, Whibley raised to three. Gromov sensed an opportunity there. Opponents hadn't mentioned Hearts. Gromov held nice Diamonds and some resistance in Clubs. Anna's opening at unfavourable vulnerability suggested good values. Gromov took a chance. He doubled and led the Nine of Spades.




Sensing trouble, Brown let the ♠9 hold the trick. Gromov continued Spades. Brown won and played the eight of Diamonds (♠8). Gromov played small, Brown went up with Dummy's King and played another Diamod on which Anna discarded ♥2, likely signalling for Clubs. Gromov won and played a Club. Anna inserted the ♣Q. Brown claimed seven tricks. That was down two for 300 to North-South.



At the other table, Sartaj opened 1 rianleq . Playing a strong-club system, he can afford to open with nine or 10 HCP. Or low overcalled 1Nt. That went Pass-Pass to Sartaj who doubled. When Andy Hung passed it, Firsova took out to 2 rianleq forgoing an opportunity to get a good positive score for a doubled and fulfilled contract. Andy Hung doubled 2 rianleq for business but Sartaj took out to 2 rianleq and that became the final contract. It went down in due course for 100 to East-West. OLIMP earned nine IMPs on the deal.

OLIMP missed an opportunity to gain a further few on the next deal. Vulnerable opposite Fresh, Matthew Brown dealt and opened 1♦, North and East passed. Anna doubled. Matthew Brown now bid 2♦. Gromov passed, Whibley passed, and Anna decided to bid Spades now. We would have liked to see Gromov's reaction there, but the live Vu Graph recording didn't quite let us witness that moment. When the tray got back to Gromov, he tabled 3Nt, a bid that suggests exasperation. 3Nt went down three for 150 to East-West.



In the Closed Room, Sartaj played in 2♠ and went down one for -50. WHAM earned three IMPs on the deal.


OLIMP scored two on Board 17 and three on Board 18. WHAM scored six on the next board – Board 19. Board 20 brought up a Grand Slam.





Both Red, Matthew Brown opened 3♠ as the dealer. Whibley found out what he needed to find out and bid 7♠ with conviction. 4♠ was optional RKC. Brown could have declined to show Aces with a 4♦ response if he had a poor hand. 5♠ showed 2 key Cards. 5♥ asked about clubs. Brown's after-the-pass double showed 2nd round Club control. There was duplication in Diamonds, all the same, the Grand Slam depended only on Clubs breaking breaking 4-3, approximately 62% chance.



In the Closed Room, the bidding lacked such precision and specificity. Firsova asked 4Nt and bid $6 \clubsuit$ when partner showed two Key Cards. She could count 12 tricks if West held seven Spades to AK. Thirteenth could come from a Diamond ruff if West held three or more Diamonds, It could come from Clubs if partner held only one or two Clubs. The only case where $7 \spadesuit$ will be in jeopardy is when West holds 7-1-2-3 without the \clubsuit Q. I guess they must be opening $6 \spadesuit$ with just six cards a little more often than we might have assumed for the above discussion. OLIMP lost 13 IMPs on the board.













Halfway through the first set, WHAM were leading OLIMP 75-35 IMPs.

Whibley mis-guessed the Heart position on the next deal. That cost them as many as 17 IMPS. Whibley dealt and opened 2♣, strong. That was a license to North-South to interfere in the auction in an unconstrained manner. Anna Gulevich overcalled 3♣. When Andrey Gromov raised to 4♣, Anna bid 4♥. Gromov raised to 5♥ giving away his 4-card holding if Anna's 4♥ bid hadn't already conveyed it. In the meantime, Brown-Whibley found their Diamond fit and bid 6Nt from Whibley's hand to protect the ♣AQ holding. Anna led a small Spade.

Whibley won \triangle A, went do Dummy with a trump and without removing North's second trump, ran the \forall T. This would have worked if South held \forall 8 singleton. Note that North's lowest card – the \forall 3 is lower than East's lowest, the \forall 4, so Whibley could have picked up North's Hearts without any loser. Unfortunately for Whibley, Anna held \forall J. She won and North-South cashed two Spades for down two and a score of +200 to North-South.




In the Closed Room, the bidding was crisp. North was on lead. He decided to lead the ♣K with a view to getting a look at the Dummy and switching to something that could help defence. Unfortunately for him, that gave Declarer the gift of a free Club finesse. That meant that the Declarer could park two Spade losers on two Club winners and safely play Heart suit for one loser. Orlov played the hand neatly by ruffing two Spades in the Closed hand, cashing a top when North played small, removing enemy trumps in the process, and then running the ♥Ten from West hand. North ducked. Orlov made 13 tricks. OLIMP won 17 IMPs on the deal.

On Board 23, Orlov-Firsova missed a game in either Major suit. West opened 1♥ in the second seat on both tables and North overcalled 1Nt. With eleven HCP, five controls, six Spades, and three-card Heart support opposite an opening, Firsova just raised to 2♥. In the Open Room, Brown-Whibley once again placed their science on display when East began with a double of 1Nt, and followed it up with a negative double when South took out to 2♦. When Brown took out to 2♥, Whibley bid a Heart game. I suspect they would have tried to explore a slam if Brown had bid anything else than the 2♥ rebid.

On Board 25, WHAM won another game swing. In the Open Room, North opened 1♦, East overcalled 1Nt, and West raised to three. With the 1♦ opener sandwiched between a 16-HCP 1Nt overcaller and a 9-HCP partner, there wasn't much problem in the play.



Anna Gulevich led the ♣T. Whibley inserted the ♣K and continued with the ♣Q when North ducked. He discarded a Spade from the Closed hand. North won and shifted to ♠Ten. Whibley won ♠Q, cashed ♠A, and exited with a Spade discarding a small club from Dummy. Anna won the trick with the ♠J and switched to a Heart rather than a Diamond, partner's bid suit. Whibley played small from Dummy. He must have been pleased to see the ♥King appear. He won ♥Ace, went to the Table with the ♥J and cashed the ♣Jack. Dummy was left with ♣7 which was a winner at that point, however, Whibley seems to have missed the spot cards in the suit.


Counting a trick for the ♣7, Whibley had nine tricks in the bag, but he went about it in a more erudite manner. He next played a Heart to the ♥Queen in the Closed hand, and played a small Diamond inserting Dummy's ♦9 when South played small. North won the ♦Jack, cashed the ♠K, but had to concede an extra trick to Dummy's Queen. 3Nt made nine tricks for 600 to East-West.

On Board 26, Both East-West reached $4 \triangleq$ from East side with a similar auction. East opened $1 \spadesuit$, West overcalled $2 \triangledown$ to show both Majors. This bid by responder is known as a reverse Flannery convention. West shows five or more Spades and four or more Hearts with 7-9 HCP. The purpose of the convention is to make sure that the Heart suit does not get lost when responder begins with a $1 \triangleq$ response holding 5 or more Spades.

Whibley won the lead with the ♣Q in the Open room and played a small trump to Jack. He then played the ♦ King. North won and backed a Club. Whibley won and ruffed a Diamond. He now played a small trump from Dummy picking up North's King. He mis-guessed Hearts, so he scored only 10 tricks.





In the Closed Room, Firsova won ♣A in the Closed hand and played a Heart to Dummy's Ten. Andy Hung won and played a Club. Firsova won ♣Q in Dummy and tabled the ♠Q. That meant she was going to lose a trick to South's Spade Ten. Two red Aces were also to be lost. She went down one. WHAM won 12 more IMPs.

At the end of set 2 WHAM led by 107 IMPs to 59.


