In the qualifiers' list there were a few surprises. **SYMPHONY**, the only team consisting of three women – Marianne Karmarkar, Rupa Bakeri, and Bindiya Naidoo finished 15th, a commendable performance.

Qualification Criteria for Match Point Pairs and IMP Pairs – HCL 2022

Approx. 184 to 190 pairs out of the total registered 264 pairs are expected to participate in the Elimination-1 round of the Match Point pair event in HCL 2022. Out of this 40% will qualify for elim-2 round. We expect 72 to 80 qualified Pairs plus approx. 40 seeded pairs will join from the losing pre-QF teams of Gold & Silver for a total of 120 pairs who will play the 2nd elimination round. The rest of non qualified pairs of elimination-1 will play in the MP Strata – II.

We qualify 40% of the 120 pairs (approx 48 to 52) to elimination-3, where they will be joined by approx 20 seeded pairs of 8 losing QF teams of Gold & Silver.

The 66 to 72 pairs will play in elimination-3 round of MP Pairs. The TOP 1-26 pairs will qualify for MP Pairs GOLD final, rank 27-52 will qualify for MP Pairs SILVER final and the rest from rank 53 to last pair of Elim-3 will qualify for the IMP Pairs final.

All those who do not qualify for MP elim-3 can participate in the IMP Pair event. We expect approx. 150+ pairs in IMP Pairs elimination round. Approx 33% that is 50 pairs will qualify for final, where they will be joined by 12 to 20 pairs from Elim-3 of MP Pairs for a 64 to 72 pairs final.

The exact qualification number will be informed by Head TD in the 1st Session of the event after the exact entries are known.

TEXAN ACES vs. FORMIDABLES - Round 6

Texan Aces defeated Rampage 16.18-3.82 and finished at the top of the table 2 after Round 5. FORMIDABLES and Mavericks shared the VP pool a little more equitably on Table 1 finishing fourth and sixth respectively in the rankings. That meant that the round six draw placed Texan Aces against FORMIDABLES on Table one. In the Open Room, P. Sridhar and Rajesh Dalal were North-South for Texan Aces, while Laltu and Sumit were East-West. In the Closed Room, Keyzad-Tewari were NS and Venkatesh-Anil were EW.

North picked up a big hand on the very first deal of the set. South didn't have much. Furthermore, opposite a Spade void, half of what he had was almost wasted, except for the purpose of Spade control in a Notrump contract. Both the Tables witnessed a 3Nt contract.



In the Open Room, Laltu overcalled 1♠ on North's 1♣ opening and Rajesh Dalal played 3Nt from South axis. On a Spade lead and back, Rajesh had 11 easy tricks. In the Closed Room, East passed, and South responded 1♠ to North's 1♣ opening and North conducted 3Nt. Venkatesh led a Diamond. Keyzad ducked twice, won the third round and cashed Clubs. In the end Keyzad did not opt to finesse against ♥Q making only 10 tricks. Texan Aces thus opened their account with a solitary IMP gain. Running Scores - Texan Aces: 1, FORMIDABLES: 0.

This is an instructive deal for those who are not satisfied with the simple High Card Point count. With three Aces out, the playability of the hand is rather limited. Although East-West hold 25 HCP between them, no game is makeable. The Aces need to be assigned slightly more weight than the normal HCP count does, it would seem.

In Both the rooms, the bidding started with a 1♦ opening by East and a 1♥ overcall by South. In the Open Room West continued with a natural 14

response and Sridhar jumped to 4♥. When it was passed around to West, he chose to double, the only reasonable option available. East took cut to 4♠ which became the final contract. With three Aces and ♠JT9, the contract was certain to go down. The only question was whether it would go down one or two.

On the lead of ♣Ten, for example, if South ducks, West wins with ♣Jack and plays a Spade giving North a Hobson's choice. If North goes up with ♠Ace, he can get a Club ruff, but South loses a natural trump trick. If North ducks, Declarer can won ♠K and pass a small Spade around to North. A ruff with a small trump is no longer available and the Declarer will make nine tricks.

Both NS having bid Hearts, North naturally led a Heart. Rajesh won the ♥A and backed another Heart. Nine tricks and 100 to NS was the result.

In the Closed Room, North jumped only to 3♥ and West had a chance to rebid 3Nt. NS made six tricks, four in Hearts and the two Aces for two down and a score of +200. FORMIDABLES won 3 IMPs as a result. Running Scores - Texan Aces: 1, FORMIDABLES: 3.

The oldest known use of a convention कटपयादि संख्या


Ancient Indian mathematicians and astronomers used conventions in an astounding manner, in a way that allowed them to embed mathematical formulae in poetic verses. Two or three different methods of expressing numbers by using characters or words were used. One common idea was to use the word for head to denote number 1; eyes for 2; and so on. The most advanced and widely used convention was what is known as the कटपयादि संख्या or expressing numbers using basic samskrit characters. Thus, a

भद्राम्बुधिसिद्धलन्नगणितश्रद्धा स्म यद् भूपगी: The above line was part of a poetic verse but it also showed the value of π , the ratio of the circumference of a circle to its diameter, to 17 decimal places. While this verse is from an ancient Indian work, modern methods have attained this kind of accuracy for the value of pi only in last hundred years or so. The poetic form made the formulae easy to remember and have therefore afforded oral transmission through hundreds, perhaps thousands of years.

In the Open Room, the bidding was uncontested. Here is another hand where the pair that holds the balance of strength is missing three Aces. With 24 HCP and no 8-card Major fit, no game is makeable, but the defence of 4♠ isn't easy here. 4♠ does not make only because the long Spades hand does not have a convenient entry for removing trumps. Before such an entry gets created, NS have to set up their Club ruff to defeat. With no clue from bidding, Rajesh

led a third best Heart. Sridhar won and played a Spade to West's Ace. Declarer played a Diamond, got an entry to East hand, removed trumps and claimed 11 tricks. 200 to EW.

In the Closed Room, Keyzad overcalled 1♥ over West's 1♦ opening. East's 2♣ presumably showed Spades as in Deal 22. Tewari jumped to 3♦ to show Heart fit and a good hand. Anil-Venkatesh reached 4♠ in the end partly pushed by the knowledge of the big Heart fit that North-South had shown. Tewari, too, had no way of smelling the killing Club lead. He too led a Heart. Keyzad won and shifted to his doubleton ♣Jack but it was too late. South could unblock ♠A, enter the Closed hand with a Heart ruff, remove trumps and claim 10 tricks. That was 620 to EW. Texan Aces got 9 IMPs as a result. Running Scores - Texan Aces: 10, FORMIDABLES: 3.

Out of the remaining boards, number 24 to 30, five – 24, 25, 27, 29, 30 – were push boards. FORMIDABLES gained 1 IMP on Board 26. Board 28 produced the biggest swing.

Sumit led the ♠Queen and Laltu cashed the AK pronto. After three rounds of trumps, On the ♣9 from South, Sumit ducked and the Declarer let it run to East. East won and shifted to a Diamond. Rajesh inserted ♦J-♦Q-♦K. Rajesh now finessed the ♦9 on the way back to Closed hand losing to ♦Ten. Sumit cashed a Spade for the setting trick. That was 100 to East-West.

After P-1 ◆-2♣, Tewari bid 2♥. Keyzad doubled Anil's 2♠ to show 3 Hearts. East could have redoubled to guide a Spade lead, but East chose to Pass. Tewari seemingly made a game try with the 3♦ bid but Anil intervened 4♣ and Tewari himself bid 4♥. Both 4♣ and 4♥ contracts should go down one, but the play took an interesting turn at the table.

Had Anil led a Spade, the defenders would likely have won first four tricks. Anil led the ♣A, the bid and supported suit. Venkatesh was eager to guide a Spade shift, but in doing so, he played the ♣Queen exposing his Club holding to the possibility of an endplay. Accurate defence was now required to manufacture a fourth trick. West alone was guarding the third round of both Spades and Diamonds and a squeeze was a distinct possibility.

Anil had to play a Club to neutralise the threat of an endplay first, and Venkatesh had to push Diamonds twice, when in with Spade honour to break the squeeze. As the play went, Anil switched to Spades, East cashed his top Spades, and played a trump. When West discarded on the second trump, the hand was almost an open book. No further play was required. A squeeze claim seems to have been made and accepted on the next trick !! NS got 620 for that effort and won 12 IMPs on the deal. Final Score - Texan Aces: 10, FORMIDABLES: 16. FORMIDABLES won the match 12.18-7.82 VPs.
