The main event consists of the Team of Four as well as Open Pairs event. To make the tournament more competitive, the Team of Four event is played in two categories – **GOLD & SILVER**. Pant, the head of operations for HCL-2023.

There are close to 150 teams entering the Gold and Silver Category put together. It is very heartening to see a lot of you coming back to live bridge.

The tournament came into being thanks to the ideas and the unstinted support of **Mrs. Kiran Nadar**, one of the top Indian players. She is a member and the sponsor of the "**FORMIDABLES**" team. The team has not only won many laurels at the National level but has also represented India umpteen times in international events. The title of HCL Gold event has illuded them in last few years although they reached the finals of the Gold event in 2022, 2021 as well as 2018. They will be looking to right the wrongs of earlier editions. All the very best - Kiran, Satya, Tewari, Sumit, Nandi, and Sagnik.

The favorites for the Gold Team championship are 'Mavericks ALL STARS' consisting of six world champions. That will be the team to beat this year. Good luck to you if you happen to draw them.

### 20th HCL International Bridge Championship 2023 – Curtain Raiser

The HCL Bridge Championship was established in the year 2003 by Mrs. Kiran Nadar, one of the top Indian players of competitive bridge, to promote the sport in India. This year's tournament offers Rs 26 Million (~ US \$310,000) as prize money to winners.

Mrs. Kiran Nadar is a member of the **"FORMIDABLES"** team that has not only won many laurels at the National level but has also represented India several times in international competitive bridge events. The team reached the finals of the Gold event in 2018 as well as in 2022 but had to be content with the runner-up spot. Kiran is married to **Mr. Shiv Nadar** who is the **Founder of HCL**, India's leading Global Technology and IT Enterprise, the sponsor for this prestigious event.

This annual tournament consists of the "Team of Four Gold and Silver" events as well as "Match Point Open Pairs and IMP Pairs" events.

The first edition of this tournament in 2003 attracted 35 teams & 89 Pairs; in 2004, it increased to 46 teams and 127 pairs; 2005 saw 70 teams & 176 Pairs, and from 2006 onwards till 2012, we always had 70 plus teams & 160 plus Pairs. The participation of all the top Indian teams in this tournament was an ample proof that this is one of the most favorite tournaments of Bridge fraternity in India. To make it more competitive for average players, the organizers in 2013 decided to divide the main Team of Four event into GOLD & SILVER categories with 40 teams in GOLD & 37 teams in Silver categories participating in the 2013 edition.

The year 2016 saw this tournament attaining great heights, when it became an **International Bridge Tournament**. The organizers invited many top foreign teams and this resulted in 41 teams participating in the GOLD and 79 teams in the SILVER event. A record 288 pairs participated in the open match point pairs. **Team "Lavazza" consisting of Zia Mahmood, Giorgio Duboin, Dennis Bilde, and Norberto Bochhi won the Gold event**. With 21 foreign teams in 2017 edition, the tournament attained a world class status. In 2018, we had 162 Teams (52 in GOLD & 110 in SILVER) and in 2019 a record 185 Teams (55 in GOLD, 102 in SILVER & 28 in Bronze category), a number that exceeded the expectation of the organizers. However, due to the onslaught of COVID, the tournament could not be held in 2020. The 2021 edition was played as an online event. The tournament was back after COVID with the 2022 edition, where 116 teams (45 in Gold & 71 in Silver) participated. The winners of the Gold event were **Dhampur Sugar Mills (Ashok Kumar Goel, Vinay Desai, Sayantan Kushari, Kaustubh Milind Bendre, Sagnik Roy, Kaustabh Nandi).** This year we are again expecting 140+ teams.

The three main trophies of the championship are detailed below:

**Naresh Tandan** Trophy for Winner of Team of Four Gold Event – This trophy has been instituted in the name of Late Shri Naresh Tandan (Mrs. Kiran Nadar's Father).

**Mohini Tandan** Trophy for Winner of Team of Four Silver Event – This trophy has been instituted in the name of Late Mrs Tandan (Mrs. Kiran Nadar's Mother).

**Neena Bonerjee** Trophy for Winner of Open MP Pairs Event – This trophy has been instituted in the name of Late Mrs. Neena Bonerjee by her daughter Nisha. Mrs. Neena Bonerjee was a lady par excellence, a true friend, a great player and even a greater ambassador of this game. Kiran was fortunate enough to have played with her as a partner or as a team mate over many years.

# India vs. World All Stars Team Match

As most of you are aware, the Indian Open team missed the qualification boat in the 46<sup>th</sup> World Championships in Marrakech in August 2023 by a very narrow margin. Norway blitzed them 20-0 in the last round of the Round Robin denying them a berth in the knockout rounds. Many of us felt that lady luck was particularly unhappy with them in that last round. If only they had made it to the Knock-Out rounds, they would have advanced much further, Indian well-wishers felt.

Knowing the sentiment, Mrs. Kiran Nadar decided to work on a novel idea. What if we gave the first-hand experience of a World Championship final to Indian Stars? If they do well, the rest of the rounds will take care of themselves, she imagined. Thus arose the idea of an All Stars challenge match. Kiran and Subodh Maskara joined hands to invite six World Stars including the legendary Zia Mehmood for a direct match against Indian All Starts. Fortunately, all the schedules worked out and a match was arranged for the last weekend of October, just before the HCL-2023 International Bridge Tournament.



The India vs World All Stars challenge match was played over 96 boards in 8 sessions on 29<sup>th</sup> and 30<sup>th</sup> October. The World All Stars team consisted of Zia Mehmood, Geir Helgemo, Ola and Mikael Rimstedt, Christian Bakke, and Boje Brogeland. Indian All stars team consisted of Jaggy Shivdasani, Sandeep Thakral, Rajeshwar Tewai, Sumit Mukherjee, Kaustubh Bendre, Sayantan Kushari, Keyzad Anklesaria, and Debabrata Majumder. Anal Shah was the Non-Playing-Captain for the Indian All Stars. Subodh Maskara and Subhash Gupta offered themselves as substitutes for the odd session or two when required. The entire match was presented on the BBO Vugraph for both the rooms and the play records are available in the archives of BBO. Moreover, when sitting out,

many of the World All-star players offered their expert comments on the play. Subhash Gupta, fondly known as 'Guruji', made himself available as a resident expert. This commentary was live-streamed on youtube on the DEMICOMA Bridge Academy youtube channel. At the end first four sessions, the World All Stars were leading 142-56. The second day was played as a second challenger contest. On the second day, the score in the end was 96-78 in favour on India All-Stars.

At the end of the match, there was an open discussion on some of the interesting deals from the match where All-stars offered their views on various situations that were encountered during the play. For paucity of time, just about one deal per session could be discussed in the open session.

Still, each session had some interesting deals and situation. In what follows, we have documented six deals from the first set.

Keyzad led ◆A, Laltu contributed the ◆2, and Keyzad shifted to a Club, no doubt guided by the small Diaomnd card, to collect a Diamond ruff. Down one.

Mikael tried a barrage 3♦ opening. With ♦KQx and sufficient strength, Jaggy opted for the regulation 3Nt overcall playing there. Ola led the ♥ T. Jaggy crossed to Dummy and played a Diamond to the ♦K. Ola produced the ◆A for a surprise, but Jaggy had the ◆T9 in the Dummy so he could get two Diamond tricks. That was 600 to EW and 12 IMPs to the Indian stars.



Both Easts opened 2N in the third seat. Both West transferred with a 3♦ bid. After East's 3♥ though, Zia continued 4♦ and opposite a passed partner Helgemo blasted to 6♦ rather than taking a slow route. Boje Brogeland was commentating on the deal. He observed that West had a borderline hand for a forward-going bid on 3♥, however, his initial pass limited his hand mitigating any chance of overreaching.

North was on the lead and it appeared a toss-up between the black suits. This is the type of situation that divides bridge players into two camps. I belong to the school of thought that would prefer to lead the shorter suit because the Declarer is more likely to hold two cards in that suit. The other camp would prefer a Club lead because it is backed by the Q. Keyzad chose the latter option leading a small Club and the Declarer had no problem in making 12 tricks.

In the Closed Room, Jaggy opted to rebid 3N. Declarer made all 13 tricks after a small Spade lead, but India Stars lost 12 IMPs. After 4 boards, the score was 12-12.

# India vs. World All Stars Team Match control



Both Souths opened 1♠ in the second seat. In the Open Room, Laltu overcalled 2♠ showing Hearts and a minor. Zia ventured 3♠ at favourable vulnerability. In the commentary box, Boje Brogeland remarked that South had to have a very strong hand for his overcall at the unfavourable vulnerability, so North might think of bidding on, however, Keyzad, not unreasonably, chose to Pass. 4. had no chance. Laltu led his singleton Club. Had he got a Club ruff, the contract would have gone down 3. Keyzad shifted to a Heart though. Down two undoubled was not at all bad for EW as NS were making a vulnerable game.

In the Closed Room, Mikael overcalled 2N showing both red suits. Ola still bid 3♥ but Mikael raised to four. That raise looked a little hopeful as North could well have had a much weaker hand for his 3♥ bid. Perhaps, NS have some other bid available for weaker hands and that 3♥ showed some values. Anyway, 4♥ was cold as the cards were and Ola promptly dropped East's doubleton Ace by using the & A entry to play a trump once through East and then playing a small trump. He lost a trick each in ♠ ♥ ♦ for +620. That was 11 IMPs to World All-Stars. The score was 23-12 at the end of five deals.

Boards 3-5 led to a double digit swing each. Board six onwards were fought over part scores each leading to a 5/6 IMP swing.

In the Closed Room, Ola chose a 1N overcall holding 18 HCP and Axx in Diamonds. One can imagine hands where a NT or a Major suit game will play better from South hand. The 1N overcall forgoes that chance. Keyzad likely opted to double with some similar thinking. That led to a very tortuous auction. Laltu took out to 1♠, Zia doubled with a suitable distribution, and Keyzad redoubled to show strength. Laltu rebid 2♠ and played there. The 5-1 break spelt his doom, and the contract went down 1. If a negative double were available to South on East's 2♦, North might have been able to bid 3♣, likely a slightly better spot. Ola's 3Nt sailed with nine tricks. Five IMPs to World All stars team.

The bidding was the same in both the rooms. North, holding a lot of tenaces was going to get endplayed many times during the course of play. Looking at all the four hands, it was easy to see how the Declarer could manage to get 8 or 9 tricks. Single Dummy, West couldn't have known that North started with a stiff Spade. Keyzad led his singleton Spade solving that problem for the Declarer. The rest was a routine matter. Keyzad's Spade lead went to South's Ten and Zia'a Ace. Zia next played a small Diamond to Dummy's Queen and pulled a Heart. South played the Nine. Zia won ♥A and backed a Heart. Keyzad cashed ♦A and ♥K and exited with a small Club hoping to find the Ten with partner. Alas, it was with the Declarer. South's ♠ KQ went to sleep.

In the Closed Room, Ola opened a weak 1Nt. East-West were unable to find their Spade fit. Jaggy overcalled 2. and Ola pressed on with a 2 bid winning the auction. Sandeep Thakral led the AK. The ideal defence would have been for East to shift to a Heart at trick two. Perhaps, reading Jaggy's 4♠ as a suit preference, Sandeep switched to & J. That was curtains for the defence. Ola won, cashed two top Diamonds and played Clubs. Sandeep ruffed the third Club but he could not prevent a Heart discard on the fourth Club. To achieve that, the defenders had to remove the Heart entry to South hand by playing a Heart early. That was +90 and a 6-IMP gain for the World All-stars. At the end of first 8 deals, they led 39-12. We have presented these deals here as a zalak of the quality of the game.
