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# It is Shourie vs Vedic and WBT Bridge App vs WHAM in GOLD Team of Four Semi Finals

The four-session Quarter Finals of the GOLD and SILVER Team of Four events got over on Thursday with **Shourie** (USA) defeating Pro3max 134-79.5; **WBT Bridge App** (Norway) making short work of 146-103.5; **WHAM** (Australia) defeating Mavericks 150-75; and **Vedic** overcoming the challenge of Texan Aces 124.5 to 101. In the Semi Finals tomorrow, Shourie play vs. Vedic while WBT Bridge App fight it out against WHAM.

In the SILVER category, Sahyadri will play against Jackalls while RSCS will play against SABASS.

The second elimination of MP Pairs also concluded today. Ami Zamir and Oren Toledano finished at the top with a score of 66.14%; K R Venkatraman and Swarnendu Banerjee were second with 65.5% score; and Bar Tamovski and Asaf Yekutieli were third with 61.86%. Top fifty (50) pairs will qualify for elimination three where they will be joined by pairs from the losing Quarter Finalists from both GOLD and SILVER categories.

### Kista and Thakral report on Board 8, Round 8, Swiss League.

We covered the diagrammed deal in Bulletin 5 on 18<sup>th</sup> September. Jody Tutty played the deal in 6 A and made her contract on a flawless exhibition of Trump Coup.

After the bulletin was published, we had some inputs, both from the players and the kibitzers. The first one was from Kista. Kista and Ashantha Demel (The pace bowler from Sri Lanka, if you followed cricket in last century and remembered the names). He bowled the first ball for srilanka in a test match. Kista also played in 6 A and made the contract on a trump coup. Proverbial Alice would have been impressed with that kind of play, however, for Kista, it was a routine matter, just another day in office, nothing special to report there, so he forgot about the deal after the day's play was over. After looking at the bulletin, he sort of woke up and messaged me that their pair got the same result. "Do you need an explanation of our auction?," he continued.



Kista opens 1♣ with 5 Diamonds and 4 Clubs just so that partner could respond 1♦ showing his expected Heart suit. Well, partner did not have Hearts, but had Spades instead, so partner bids 1♥ to transfer to Spades (They play transfer responses over 1♣ opening). The further rounds of bidding unearthed the 5-3 Spades, one key card with East, and ♠Q and ♦K. To cut the long story short, Kista became the Declarer in 6♠ and brought home the contract with a regulation trump coup.

Meanwhile, Sandeep Thakral lamented a missed opportunity to execute that Trump coup. As it happened, for the given layout, they bid the hand very well to reach a better contract of 6. The contract played itself without any need for any exotic play, so to say. Let us look at their auction, for that reason.

The explanation in the figure should make most of the ideas clear. Still, the subtle slam suggestion needs a bit of elaboration. For that, one must note that East-West had found a Spade fit first. Jaggy's 4 hid was a suggestion to play there, not a Cue-bid, or a forward-going move per se. With two small Hearts, Sandeep would have been happy to pass and play there.

With stiff Heart, he could afford to play one level higher. The 5\* bid thus conveyed the message of a singleton Heart in a subtle manner. It was not a Cue bid, it was not an asking bid, nor was it an answer to any asking bid. It was merely a statement that the partnership could afford to play a 5-level contract thereby implying that there were no two fast Heart losers.

Jaggy was happy with that suggestion so Jaggy bid 6.4. Clubs were 3-3, so there was nothing to play there.

### Quarter Finals : Pro3max vs Shourie Session 3

In the Quarter Finals, Pro3max, a team from Russia consisting of Evgeny Rudakov, Sergey Orlov, Maxim Feofanov, Mikhail Toprover, Elena Rudakova, alexei Gerasimov played against Shourie, a team from US, comprising of John Kranyak, Vincent Demuy, Gavin Wolpert, Rajath Shourie, John Hurd, Kevin Bathurst. Pro3max started with a carryover of 6.5 based on their 13-0 win over Shourie in the Swiss League stage. In the first session, Shourie scored 26 IMPs to 15 of Pro3max; and in the second session Pro3max prevailed with a 24-23 score. Thus, at the end of two sessions, Shourie were leading with a score of 49 to 45.5

The third session was a swingy one. In the first eleven deals, there were six double digit swings. Let us have a look at some of them. But before we do that, give a thought to a defence problem



Deal 9, North dealer, East-West vulnerable. You are North. You opend 1Nt, East bids 4 A and plays there. How do you plan to defend from here?

Over to the first few swingy deals of the match.



Elena opened a Polish 1<sup>\*</sup> and Gerasimov responded 1<sup>\*</sup>. With South's Diamond Kx exposed to a finesse on the Opening lead, the Russian North-South were not inclined to bid a slam. When North failed to Cue 4<sup>\*</sup> on South's 4<sup>\*</sup>, South subsided in 4<sup>\*</sup>. Hurd led a Diamond, but not the Ace. He chose <sup>•</sup>9. Diamond King held and Gerasimov quickly rapped up 13 tricks.



# Quarter Finals : Pro3max vs Shourie Session 3 (Contd.)

In the other room, Demuy opened a Natural 1♠ and North bergened 3♦ to show a good Spade fit and a medium hand. With the ♦ Kx protected, the American North-South were happy to bid 6♠. West led a small Club and the Declarer scored easy 13 tricks. 11 IMPs to Shourie. Shourie led the session 11-2, and overall by 60-47.5 IMPs.

Gerasimov opened a Polish 1. on this board, and after a negative 1  $\bullet$  response began with a 1. rebid and a jump to 3. to show Spades and longer Diamonds. South's 3. was directional. With  $\bullet$  AJ, North was happy to bid 3Nt, however, the auction didn't get across South's three controls (A and  $\bullet$  K) and the ruffing values in Majors.

In the other room, Kranyak began with a natural 1 ◆ and reversed with 2 ♠ on partner's 1Nt. After 3 ♣ -3 ◆ bids, Demuy spurned the 3 ♥ directional asking bid choosing the 4 ◆ bid instead. Part of the reason was his original 1Nt response. Having grabbed the Notrump conduction into his hand, it wouldn't have been prudent to look for a Heart control with partner late in the auction. His 4 ◆ bid made virtue out of necessity and it worked very well on the layout. After one round of cue-bids, they settled into a Diamond slam. 12 tricks were easy. That was +1370 and 12 more IMPs to the American team.

### Quarter Finals : Pro3max vs Shourie Session 3 (Contd.)

Board 7 was a defence problem.



After another Polish 1\* opening, by Elena and a more or less natural follow-up, North-South reached 3Nt from North side. Hurd duly led  $\diamond$ 3 that looked like a third card from partner's naturally bid suit. The Dummy had a singleton Diamond. Bathurst had no side-suit entry. All he needed to do was to play a lower honour -  $\diamond$ J or  $\diamond$ T on the first trick to defeat the contract. Declarer would have had to go out to East with the \*A and East-West could have collected five easy tricks.

Bathurst won the first trick with the  $\diamond$  King and shifted to  $\checkmark$  Jack. 3Nt made 10 tricks. Which move was the real culprit in this board? Was it the unnecessary  $1 \checkmark$  bid, or was it the first-round play of West? Looking at the Dummy, I am inclined to to blame the latter move.

In the other room, the American North-South played in 2 . 10 tricks are available in Spades but a route to that contract in bidding seems a little difficult.



On Board Elena-Gerasimov reached a slam with 16 opposite 13 and one of the hands being 4333. Luck wasn't on their side and they lost another 11 IMPs when the American North-South played in a routine 3Nt contract.

This was the problem Kranayak faced. With the Diamond Ace entry, Kranyak decided to go for an immediate reward. He won ♥A and returned Heart. Declarer won ♥K, played trumps off the top and claimed 11 tricks.

The winning defence is a subtle one. North needs to play the  $\mathbf{v}$ 6 keeping the  $\mathbf{v}$ J as a resistance. If North squanders the  $\mathbf{v}$ J on trick one, Declarer gets a vital entry to Dummy to play the  $\mathbf{*}$ 9 through  $\mathbf{*}$ JT and manoeuvre in such a way that North could be strip-squeezed. This is only a double dummy possibility, however, if North is not going to win the  $\mathbf{v}$ A, it does make an innate sense not to squander that  $\mathbf{v}$ Jack. ### A beautiful squeeze. Did you make 12 tricks here?

The diagrammed deal came up in the last session of the Pre Quarter Finals. A small slam requires Spade finesse to succeed. It is just about 50% chance. In the GOLD category, 10 out of 16 Tables managed to stay out of it; in the SILVER category, 10 out of 16 tables bid it. Boards like this help us tell something about the quality of the field.

While looking at the field scores, I also noticed that the contract made on one table.

How could the contract make? Could it be because of some silly mistake by a defender, or was it because of some brilliant play? Perhaps, because of both?

Say East leads the  $\bullet$  Jack. You win  $\bullet$  K and play a Club. West wins  $\bullet$  A and makes a glaring mistake by backing a Club. Will you be able to make 12 tricks?

You should, on a crisscross squeeze. Win the Club, cash Hearts, and cash two more Clubs ending in the Dummy.

Finally, late in the night, after the music had stopped, a tired Thakral turned up to tell the tale. Keyzad played in 6Nt. After the ♦ Jack lead, he won, played a Club to the ♣ Queen in the Closed hand, and played a *small club* to Dummy's ♣T. This was the situation with West yet to play. Played cards are grayed out.



West now had a smart thought. Declarer was finessing against East's &Jack, West imagined. If so, and if they won the &Ace, Declarer would have no choice but to play the &K later in the play, and the &J would crash giving the Declarer another trick with &9.

What if West ducked? That would leave the Declarer with a guess as to whether West started with Axx or Axxx, whether to pin the AJ next, or not. Accordingly, West ducked. The Club Ace now went to sleep. Keyzad switched his attention to Spades and made 12 tricks with four Hearts, three each in Spades and Diamonds, and two Clubs. That was how the +990 score arose!
