#### **Team WHAM lifts the Naresh Tandan Trophy**

WHAM(Sartaj Hans, Andy Hung, Michael Whibley, and Matthew Brown from Australia and New Zealand) defeated Shourie(Rajath Shourie, Gavin Wolpert, John Kranyak, Vincent Demuy, Kevin Bathurst, and John Hurd from USA) in a close math in the GOLD category of the Team of four event to lift the Naresh Tandan Trophy. First, third, and fourth sessions were tight, with IMP scores 40-35, 25-28, and 23-25 for Shourie. WHAM won the third session 29-4. That difference was enough to overcome the carry-over score of six IMPs Shourie started with. WHAM eventually won by 117-98 IMPs. The first session of the match is covered in detail in this bulletin.



In the play-off WBT Bridge App (Norway) beat Vedic 116-58.

**Mohini Tandan Trophy** for Team of Four SILVER category was lifted by **RSCS** (Ramprosad Das, Subrata Chakraborty, Sanjay Raha, Chandan Choudhury). They beat **Jackalls** (D.P. Acharya, Shubham Acharya, Mridul Das, Nukesh Ghatia, Shubhrajit Mukhopadhyay, Hemant Kumar Sarma) by 119-84.6 IMPs. In the play-off for third position, **Sahyadri** defeated **Sabass** 77-58 IMPs.

**S. Sunderram and P. Shridharan** clinched the **Neena Bonerjee Trophy** when they won the Match-Point GOLD Pairs final with a score of 63.21%. **Binod Kumar Shaw and Sanjit Dey** were the runners-up with a score of 58.38%. **Marianne Karmarkar and Sandeep Karmarkar** were third with 56.37%.

**Jodi Tutty and David Beauchamp** won the Match-Point Silver final with 61.02%. **Pijus Kanti Baroi and Satyabrata Mukherjee** finished runners-up with 57.92% score.

**TV Ramani-Subhash Bhavnani** won the IMP Pairs event with +126.5 IMPs. **Goutam Pore and Suman Banerjee** finished second with 107.6 IMPs. **Dibyendu Shee and Debashish Bhadra** won IMP Pairs strata-II with a score of 126.2 IMPs.

The HCL 2024 International Bridge Championships, the 21st edition of the event, concluded on Saturday with the conclusion of these events. It was a grand festival of Bridge with participation from the West and East. We thank all the participants for making this event a great success and look forward to hosting even more teams in the next edition.



# GOLD Team of Four Semifinal: WHAM vs WBT Bridge App, Set 4


The fourth session of the GOLD Team of Four match was equally keenly contested to that of all other sets. The tension in the room was palpable. Those who watched the livestream might have noticed that.

WHAM began with a 87-65 IMP lead at the end of the third session. The session started with a bang on deal 15, the very first deal. Let us look at the bidding in the Closed room first. The bidding was simple. Andersen opened 1♦ and rebid 2♦ on Charlsen's 1♥ response. Charlsen bid 4♥. You can hardly find fault with that bid. The Heart suit is quite good with all the middle cards so the hands should have a good play in 4♥.

As it turned out, there wasn't. Sartaj led a Spade. Charlsen won the  $\bigstar$ K and played a Diamond pronto. Sartaj won and played another Spade. Charlsen won in the Dummy and played the  $\bigstar$ Q discarding a Spade. Sartaj won and attacked the other black suit now. Charlsen won  $\bigstar$ K and played  $\blacktriangledown$ A and  $\blacktriangledown$ Q, but Andy Hung won  $\blacktriangledown$ K and played a Club to drive out Club Ace. He still had trumps left to ruff Diamonds, so Charlsen was unable to discard his third Club. Down one was the result.



In the Open Room, Brown and Whibley handled the auction quite admirably.



After the same beginning of 1 ◆ -1 ♥ -2 ◆, Whibley bid 2 ♠ to force, with 3163, Brown rebid 2Nt. With other shapes, or with a wide open Club suit, Brown would have avoided the 2Nt rebid. Whibley now forced with 3 ♥ and Brown opted to bid 3Nt. As the cards were, 3N was cold. A Spade lead would have restricted it to 9 tricks, but Bakke led a small Club and Wes's ♣T won the first trick. That was 430 to EW and 10 IMPs to WHAM (Australia).

# GOLD Team of Four Semifinal: WHAM vs WBT Bridge App, Set 4 (Contd.)

On Board 21, WBT pulled back some IMPs. North opened 1♥ in the first position and the bidding proceeded 1♥-1N-X-P-P-2♦. In the Open Room, Boje doubled for penalty and collected a cool 800. In the Closed Room, Sartaj passed. Perhaps that was for penalties, too, but Andy Hung didn't double. He bid 2♠ instead and collected +110. That was an 11-IMP pullback for the WBT App team.



That was the last significant gain for the Norway team. 89-103 was the closest they came. WHAM won the match 131-92.

## GOLD Team of Four Final, Set 1

Yesterday, 21<sup>st</sup> September 2024, was the last day of the main Team of Four event of the HCL-2024 International Bridge tournament. Both the GOLD and the SILVER category Finals started at 9:00 AM, one hour earlier than the other days, to facilitate return travel in the evening.

In the GOLD Final, WHAM (Sartaj Hans, Andy Hung, Michael Whibley, and Matthew Brown from Australia) played against Shourie (Rajath Shourie, Gavin Wolpert, John Kranyak, Vincent Demuy, Kevin Bathurst, and John Hurd). In Set 1, in the Open Room, Matthew Brown and Michael Whibley were West and East respectively for WHAM while John Kranyak was North, and Vincent Demuy, South for team Shourie. In the Closed Room, Rajath Shourie was West and Gavin Wolpert, East, for team Shourie, whereas Andy Hung was North, and Sartaj Hans, South, for team WHAM. In their direct match in the Swiss League stage, Shourie had beaten WHAM by 19 IMPs to 7, a 12-IMP difference. Half of that – six IMPs – was the carryover Shouries team started with in the finals by virtue of that Swiss League win.

Board one produced a 4-IMP swing in favour of the American team.



In the Open Room, Vincent Demuy, sitting south, opened 1♠ and it was passed all around. With a wide-range 1♠ opening, the responder has to pass if they hold a weak hand in terms of HCP strength. That risks missing a game. Imagine South held a little more strength, say AQx and ♣KT9x, a 4♥ game would have had a good chance of success.

East-West did well to pass this out. As it was, the best contract for North-South was in Hearts, not in Spades. Against 1, West led a top Diamond and switched to a Club. The defence collected their Club ruff, and the Declarer, his eight tricks. +110 to North-South.

In the Closed Room, South opened West overcalled 1 ◆ and East raised to three. That provided an opportunity for North-South to find their best spot, a sort of stepping-stone Scenario in the auction. Had Sartaj doubled 3 ◆, Andy would have taken out to 3 ♥, however, Sartaj elected to bid 3 ♠ and played there. He made the same eight tricks. Down one, 50 to East-West was the result. Shourie team opened their account with a 4-IMP gain.

Board three produced the first big swing, a double digit swing.



In the Open Room, Kranyak overcalled 4♥ over Brown's 1♣ opening. With 12 HCP, Whibley passed, nor did Brown come in with a negative double. 4♥ went down three for +150 to East-West. In the Closed Room, Rajath Shourie opened 1Nt. Andy Huang could now venture only up to 3♥ level. That is what he did, but Gavin had a simple 3Nt continuation. Rajat made easy 10 tricks to earn +630 and a 10-IMP swing for the American team. Shourie led WHAM 20-1.



On Board 5, Kranyak opened 2♣, presumably, multi that includes BALanced hands of 18-19 HCP, Whibley overcalled 2♠ (?) and Kranyak rebid 2♥ in the balancing position and played there. Hearts were 4-1, however, before East-West could develop Diamond winners, Kranyak could develop a trick for his fourth Club. Kranyak made 8 tricks for +110.

In the Closed Room, North-South perhaps made too many bids. After West advanced 1Nt on East's 1♦ overcall, North could well have doubled with a more-or-less BALanced hand. South could have passed 2♥ with a 4333 and just the ♦ Ace that was going to be of any value. Finally, North's 4♥ also seems like a hopeful bid. North-South reached 4♥ and went down two for -200. Shourie won 7 IMPs. The running score was Shourie:27 - WHAM: 1

WHAM pulled back 12 IMPs on Board 7 when Kranyak-Demuy overreached a Club slam. Notice how a meek 2 • overcall of Brown set the cat amongst the pigeons after Demuy opened 1 • North could show his great Club holding naturally, with a 3 • bid, so he did. Whibley bid 3 • With AAK in Majors, a stiff Diamond, and three small Clubs, playing IMPs, South could afford to play in 5 • , so he Cue bid 4 • Partner signed-off with a 5 • bid, but South gave him a more respectable HCP holding than the one he had. The duplication in Diamond shortness didn't help nor did opponents' bidding give a hint of it (remember the work meek). South raised to 6 • .

Whibley led the ◆A and shifted to a small Spade. Kranyak went up with ♠A, removed trumps in three rounds, and played a Spade from the Closed hand. Whibley went up with the ♠K crashing partner's Queen and Kranyak claimed 11 tricks. That was 100 to East-West.

In the Closed Room, Rajath Shourie jumped to 3 ◆ over South's 1♠ opening. North had an automatic negative double, East raised to 4 ◆, but South had no idea about the running Club suit. South wouldn't have imagined a slam even in his wild dreams. South bid 4 ♥ and played there. There were 10 easy tricks, so North-South collected +620. That was worth 12 IMPs. Shourie now led 27-13.

Board 8 was flat. On Board 9, the Australians pulled back a further 8 IMPs.



In the Open Room, Whibley opened 1♣ a la Standard American. South doubled and North took out to 1♠. That is where the auction ended. North-South could have made enough tricks for game in any of the four denominations they didn't play in. Eleven each were available in Clubs and Hearts, and 10 each in Spades and Notrump. There were feasible routes to some of these games. For one, South could have overcalled 1Nt on slightly insufficient values. Or else, North could have forced with 2♣, or North could have bid 2♠ to show 8-9 HCP if he didn't particularly like his 10-HCP 4-3 holding. Anyway. North made 9 tricks for a score of +110.

In the Closed Room, North opened 1 ◆. Perhaps, the strong Club system affords them that luxury of opening light. East doubled, South passed forcing West to come out and then doubled West's 1♥. North rebid 1Nt and South raised to three. East led a Heart and the Declarer made easy 11 tricks. That was worth +430 and 8 IMPs. Shourie now led 27-21.

On Board 10, Shourie team added seven IMPs.



The bidding in the open room was pretty scientific. After hearing West's double, Whibley must have made up his mind to eventually bid 4♠, however, he didn't rush to do so. He began with a 2♦ Forcing bid. South bid 3♦ and West passed. That was an indication of a semi-balanced hand; a hand that didn't have too much length in any unbid suits. East now made a negative double of North's 4♦ and bid 4♠ over West's 4♥ takeout.

South led a cheeky small Heart. There was a double dummy line to make. Go up with ♥A, remove trumps with a correct Queen guess, and concede an open Heart trick. A Club goes on fourth Heart winner. Whibley understandably played a small Heart from the Dummy. North won and gave South a Club ruff after which South cashed his top Diamonds. Much credit must go to North-South for their good score here.

In the Closed room, West ended up bidding Spades first, so the game would have been doomed on a Club lead, but East-West settled for 3♠. Andy Hung led the ♥K looking for a quick ruff if partner held the Ace. Ten tricks and a score of +170 resulted for East-West. Shourie got seven IMPs as a result. Shourie now led 34-21.

On Deal13, Shourie added another 12 IMP.



The contract was 4♥ in both the rooms. The lead was the same - ♦6. In the Open Room, Brown won and played the ♣J. Kranyak inserted ♣Q. Whibley won the ♠K and pushed a Spade. Kranyak won, played a trump to ♥Q, and played ♥A. When ♥K dropped, he claimed 10 tricks. +620 to Shourie.

In the Closed Room, Shourie won •Ace and backed a Diamond. Hung discarded a Club. Wolpert ruffed and pushed a Spade. If Hung had played a trump, he, too, would have made 10 tricks. He played a Club instead to the •Q in the Closed hand. Gavin won. He didn't smell the singleton with partner, but he pushed another Spade and North had to lose one more trick. There was no route to the winner • Queen after removing Trumps. Down 1 was the result. Shourie now led 46-21.

On Board 14, the last board of the set, WHAM scored 14 IMPs, the biggest swing of the set.



Whibley dealt and opened 2♥ as East, Brown raised to four, and Kranyak doubled with a 4045 hand holding only 11 HCP. East and South passed and Brown redoubled. North-South had 10 tricks playing in Clubs, however, there was no way to find that spot. Kranyak couldn't unilaterally bid 5♣ or come out with 4Nt. Demuly liked to defend 4♥, so 4♥XX became the final contract. It would have gone down on a Club lead, but South understandably led from a doubleton Spade holding. Whibley won in hand and ran the ♥Q-♥K-♥A and drove out ♥J. With ♠QTx in the Closed hand, he had two easy Spade entries. He could removed trumps and discard a Club on Dummy's fourth. The redoubled contract made giving the Australian team a score of 880.

In the Closed room, Gavin passed as East and continued to take a pessimistic view of the hand after partner showed 18-19 BALanced. East-West never entered the auction. Sartaj, too, led the ♠9. Gavin opted to play the trumps starting with the ♥A. He lost two trumps, two Diamonds, and a Club. That was +50 to North-South and 14 IMPs to the WHAM team. The score, at the end of the 14-board session, was 46-35 in favour of Shourie.



During the lunch interval, Kista gave me the following hand. North deals and opens.

"How should South bid their hand?," he asked.

"Depends on the method they are using," I cautiously replied.



"Here is how our opponents bid it," he continued.

South transferred to Hearts with a 4 ♦ bid and asked for Roman Key Cards with 4Nt. North showed two without the Queen.

South quickly figured out the best contract. He had 16 HCP. Partner showed 20-21. If the ♥Q were missing, partner had to have all the remaining top honours if partner held 21. 7♥ might not be a good contract, but 7Nt might be, so he bid 7Nt.

North South had 14 tricks! 7Nt sailed. Tonmoy Ghosh was South and Ramkrishna Majumder was North.

"That 7Nt bid was a brilliant idea, wasn't that?," Kista said. "We should publish the good deeds of the keen bridge players who might not be at a level to win a high calibre bridge tournament such as the HCL International Bridge Championship, but they are good enough to find out a stunning move or two, and we should make it a point to celebrate such brilliance." He continued. I couldn't agree more.

Finally, I wish to thank Padmashri Mrs. Kiran Nadar who has generously authored this grand celebration of Bridge by bringing together many great bridge minds from all over the wider world.
