ARUN JAIN - GOPIKA TANDAN lift the NK Gupta trophy

The five-session 50-deal final of the Mixed Pairs IMP concluded today with Arun Jain and Gopika Tandan lifting the NK Gupta trophy with a score of +69 IMPs. Alka Kshirsagar and Joyrup Mullick finished second with +68 IMPs. Marianne Karmarkar and Sandeep Karmarkar finished third with 54.3 IMPs.

In the SILVER category, TV Ramani and Bindiya Kohli finished at the top with 72.2 IMPs. Dagmar Neumann and Maurits van der Vlugt finished second with 60.00 IMPs. In the Strata-II Pairs Aditi Sahastrabuddhe and Hemant Purkar finished at the top with 91.8 IMPs.

GOLD Team of Four promises to be a tough event.

A total of 51 teams have registered in the Team of four, GOLD category for the 21st HCL International Bridge Championship. In the silver category, there are 91 teams.

Out of the 51 teams in the GOLD category, two are from Australia, one from Norway, one from Israel, one from Italy, one from Russia, and one from Bangla Desh.

Four of the six members of the Norway team that will be contesting at Buenos Aires are playing as team WBT Bridge App. Boje Brogeland is the captain of the team. This will be the team to watch in this 21st edition of the HCL International Bridge Tournament.

From the US of A, Rajnath Shourie brings team Shourie consisting of the famous Youtuber and Bridge Professional Gavin Wolpert, a long established pair of Kevin Bathurst and John Hurd, and also John Kranyak and Vincent Demuy.

From Down Under, the original Delhi-iteSartaj Hans gets Team WHAM— a 4-member team consisting of Michael Whibley, Andy Pei-en Hung, Sartaj Hans, Matthew Brown. His next book will be on his exploits in the HCL-2024 championship, we are given to understand.

Kiran Nadar's Formidables team will be having another go at the title that has eluded them all these years despite having reached the finals several times. Mavericks, Dhampur Sugar Mills, Texan Aces, and Hemant Jalan are the other strong Indian teams that are contenders for the top spot for Team of four GOLD category.





Mixed Pairs IMP GOLD category final, Session 1

The five-session final round of the GOLD category of the Mixed Pairs IMP event for NK Gupta trophy, the new introduction to the stable of HCL International Bridge Championship, was played yesterday. A total of 102 Pairs participated in the elimination round out of which the top 26 made it to the GOLD category final after five rounds of 10 boards each.

At the end of the first session Gopika Tandan and Aurn Jain, with a score of +70 IMPs led the field. (photos). Rajeev Khandelwal and Himani Khandelwal, one of the three Pairs representing India in the mixed category at the forthcoming World Championships in Buenos Aires, Argentina occupied the second spot with +67.2 IMPs. Asha Sharma, a member of the Indian women's team, pairing with Abhijit Chakraborty was placed third with 54.3 IMPs. Some interesting deals from the first session are reported elsewhere in this bulletin.

Over the next sessions, the positions kept changing as they do in the Swiss IMP events, however, the position after 46 boards as shown in the figure below should tell you that the three Pairs that started at the top of the table continued to hold their leading positions albeit with a bit of shuffle amongst themselves.

Last four boards, however, proved to bring much stronger winds that swept away two of those top three position holders. Rajeev Khandelwal and Himani Khandelwal lost



20 IMPs in the last four boards whereas Asha Sharma and Abhijit Chakraborty lost 10 IMPs in last two boards the two pairs finishing in the fourth and the 12th position respectively.

There was a scoring correction that didn't help either. It catapulted Alka Kshirsagar and Joyrup Mullick to the second position. Alka was on cloud 9 and was all praise for her young partner the partnership being formed just in the nick of time to make to the deadline of entries. That should Augur well for the Indian ladies team as Alka's prime objective in participating in the Mixed Pairs event was to get some practice of playing in an Open event rather than restrict herself only to the ladies' events. That did work out well here. Let us wish her all the best for





Mixed IMP Pairs Final, GOLD, Round 1

As reported in yesterday's bulletin, Kiran Nadar and Satya Here is how the first few tricks went. were tied for 26th place with Fernanda Soares and Ashis Pan, who also finished with +31 IMPs. The tie was broken as per the rules in the SCoC, page 65 of the BFI handbook. Kiran and Satya won the tie-breaker with a 21-7 score.


The first round of the Mixed IMP Pairs final, GOLD section started with the top qualifier pair playing against the last qualifier. Kiran Nadar and Satya were pitted against Andrey Purushottam and Meenal Thakur. The two deals that came up in the first round were not without interest.




The bidding was simple. Kiran employed a two over one 2. bid to force, supported Spades in the second round, and Satya signed-off in 4♠. The play was of interest not so much because how it went on this table, but because what happened elsewhere, because it is instructive to have a look at a different way of playing a contract.

East started with ♥AK and shifted to the ♠T. Satya won ♠J in the Closed hand, played the &Q to &A, ruffed a small Club, removed two more trumps ending in Dummy and ran the &J. He could discard two Diamonds on Dummy's Clubs and make 11 tricks.

This was the bidding at one other table.






The Declarer could have made 12 tricks after that start but chose to play East for ♣King and lost one extra trick making 10 tricks. Four Norths out of 13 made only 10 tricks.



On Board 2, Kiran opened 1♣ and Satya responded 1♦ to show four or more Hearts. Kiran rebid 1♠ (some South players chose to rebid 3. on that hand), and on Satya's 1N rebid, jumped to 3. That completed the description hand in a nice manner. Satya now spent quite a bit of time on his next move but decided against bidding 3Nt, which was the right thing to do.

Against 3. West led a top Heart and shifted to a Diamond. Kiran won, ducked a Spade, won East's trump push with a top trump, played ♠A and ruffed a Spade, took a discard on Dummy's Diamond King and made easy nine tricks. Elsewhere, some Norths decided to try 3Nt. Two went down but as many as 5 scored 3 Nt.

On Deal 5 in round 3, Prosenjit and Deepa bid a good slam against Kiran and Satya. A total of six pairs bid and made 6.



Deal 7 from Round 4 that Kiran and Satya played Asha Sharma and Abhijit Chakroborty was a good Dummy play problem.



East led \$8 that looked like a singleton. Satya won \$A unblocking the \$7 from the Closed hand — a thoughtful move — and pulled the \$Queen. West covered, Satya won the \$Ace and continued with \$Ten. Asha Sharma won \$J\$ but had no quick entry to West hand for getting a Club ruff. She exited with a Diamond. Satya won, removed trumps, and played \$K\$ and \$J\$ driving out the \$Q\$. He later discarded a Heart on Dummy's lowly \$2\$.



Joyjit also played in 4 \(\times \) and got the same \(\times \) lead. Joyjit ran it to \(\times \) Q and the \(\times \) K in the Closed hand and played a small trump to Dummy's Queen. West won and gave East a Club ruff, but her \(\times \) Came down on the play of the \(\times A \) and Joyjit was able to make 10 tricks. Only two pairs reached the 4 \(\times \) game.

The play in 3Nt would be interesting though. The West hand has long diamonds and Akxx, so the Declare can apply some pressure by cashing clubs. Perfect defence would be need to get 3Nt down. Indeed at the two tables where it was played, defence failed to prevail.
