

#### **FORMIDABLES top the GOLD category**

After five rounds of Swiss League, **Formidables** (*Kiran Nadar, B. Satyanarayana, Rajeshwar Tewari, Sumit Mukherjee, Kaustabh Nandi, and Saganik Roy*) are at the top of the table of GOLD category Team of Four event with 69.72 VPs. **Shourie** (*Rajnath Shourie, Gavin Wolpert, Vincent Demuy, John Kranyak, Kevin Bathurst, and John Hurd*) were in the second position with 68.7 VPs.

EISK and Hemant Jalan were joint third with 68.09 VPs. Acemates (66.7), Indian Chain (66.47), Pro3max, a team from Russia (65.16), and ERNIS (64.11) were in fifth to eighth position respectively.

Karate Kids, a team from Israel was ninth with 61.08 VPs. Some strong teams such as Texan Aces, Mavericks, and Dhampur Sugar Mills do not figure in the first 16 after the end of five rounds. Similarly, WHAM from Australia are just about 16<sup>th</sup> while WBT Bridge App from Norway, with a tally of 47.63 are 32<sup>nd</sup>. The 4-member Norway team is 2/3 of the team that will represent Norway in the World Championships at Buenos Aires in November 2024. They are expected to do better in tomorrow's rounds. 16 Top Teams will qualify for the Knock-out stage that begins with pre-Quarter-Finals.

#### **Team of four SILVER category**

After five rounds of Swiss league of 10 boards each, in the SILVER category of the team of four event, team **Dehradun** consisting of R.V. Chauhan, T.K. Mandal, Yashpal, and Rahul Agarwal topped the table with 78.7 VPs. **Team Kabra** (Pallab Sinha, Pallab Roy, Kamal Kabra, Indranil Chakraborty, Gopal Das, and Shantanu Roy) were at the second place with 76.5 VPs.

Dilip Atha B (73.49), Marbles (69.95), Capa India (69.67), and Dazzle (69.5) were in the third to sixth position.

There will be five more rounds of Swiss League tomorrow. After 10 rounds, Sixteen teams will qualify to play the Pre-Quarter finals that will be played on Wednesday.

In the first round of the Team of Four GOLD category, Mavericks were playing against Hemant Jalan. In the Open Room, Keyzad-Harald were North-South for Mavericks while S. Datta and G. Manna were West-East for Hemant Jalan team. In the Closed Room, Sayantan Kushari-Kaustubh Bendre were North-South for Hemant Jalan while Jaggy Shivdasani-Sandeep Thakral were West-East.

The first deal was flattish. On the correct guess of &J, Datta made 11 tricks while Jaggy made only 10. The fireworks started in the Closed Room with the second deal.

After a routine third seat 1 A opening by West and a 2 A overcall, Thakral bid 2Nt to show a mixed raise, a hand that is not strong enough for a limit raise but is stronger than a preemptive raise. South showed his Hearts. Thakral reverted to 4 A on the next round. When it was passed around to Sayantan, he bid 4Nt, likely to show two places to play. Kaustubh was OK with Clubs. He bid 5 A and it got doubled.

Sayantan ruffed the ♠ lead, ran the ♣Ten on the next trick, played a Club to King, ruffed a Spade, removed last trump, and played ♥A and ♥J driving out the ♥K. He made 12 tricks for a score of 950.

In the Open Room, Harald opened 2♥, weak and Datta overcalled 2♠. Keyzad jumped to 4♥ first time, but also introduced Clubs at the five level when he got another opportunity. With a huge fit, East-West pushed to 5♠. That went down two doubled, but -300 was a great score in comparison to the +950 their teammates collected in the other room. Running Scores: Hemant Jalan 13 IMPs - Mavericks 0.

On Board 3, NS in both the rooms reached the inferior contract of 1N, the bidding going 1S-P-1N-PPP. North South have a 5-3 Heart fit and North has a 55 in reds. It certainly is not a notrumpish hand from North's point of view, however, sufficient tools aren't available in common systems to navigate this type of distributional hands opposite a Major suit opening. Anyway.





In the Open Room, Manna led a fourth best \$6, to \$Q and \$A. Datta next cashed the \$Jack and played the \$2. Was this a signal for a Diamond interest? It would seem that way as Manna won and shifted right away to the \$Ten. That was enough to beat the contract by a trick. Declarer played a small Diamond from the Dummy, West won the \$K and East-West collected their seven tricks in one go.

The bidding began with East's 1♥ opening and West's 2♥ raise. Both Norths overcalled 2♠. In the Open Room, Manna passed letting North play in 2♠. He led a top Heart and shifted to the Jack of Clubs pronto. The Declarer has chance against that defence. East-West got two tricks each in rounded suits and one each in the pointed suits. The contract went down one for a score of +100 to East-West.

In his book 'To Bid or Not to Bid', Larry Cohen had twisted the maxim 'eight ever, nine never' that Bridge students were asked to follow when deciding whether to finesse for a Queen or not. Larry advocated 'eight never, nine ever' instead, but that was meant to apply to competitive bidding, not to a finesse situation. The idea was that one doesn't compete at three level with eight-card fit. Well, Sandeep Thakral decide not to follow the rule and bid one more for the road.

South led a Spade to partner's Ace and Sayantan shifted to  $\blacklozenge$  9. That went to  $\blacklozenge$  J and Queen which Thakral ducked. He won the  $\blacklozenge$  K continuation with the Diamond Ace and cashed Heart AK. Had he opted for a Heart finesse, he would likely have made 9 tricks. As the play went, North got his  $\blacklozenge$  Queen and NS got two tricks in Diamonds in addition to one each in the black suits. Down one was the result. Five more Imps went to Heman Jalan team's account. Running Scores: Hemant Jalan 22 IMPs - Mavericks 0.

On Board 5, the bidding in the Closed Room seemed like a routine one Sayantan rebidding 1N after 1♥-1♠ uncontested sequence with a 3532 hand. One Notrump would have gone down on the lead of a Diamond honour from a holding of QJxxx. Thakral elected to lead a small Diamond. 1Nt made 8 tricks. That was +120 to NS.

Keyzad-Harald ended up in 3 A, a contract that had no chance. Mavericks lost a further six IMPs on this board. Running Scores: Hemant Jalan 28 IMPs - Mavericks 0.

Boards six and seven were flattish boards. Mavericks lost a further one IMP on Board 6 though. Finally, On Board 8, Mavericks pulled back a chunk of IMPS. The board featured a choice of contract between 4 of a Major and 3Nt with a 4-4 Major suit fit.



In the Open Room, after 1\*-1\*-2\* uncontested sequence, Harald, with his tenace-laden hand, jumped to 3N. With a 4333 shape, Keyzad had no reason to move back to 4\*. Keyzad passed. On a Club lead, 3Nt would have gone down. Perhaps, there is a case for not leading a Diamond with the poor 4-HCP holding that the West had, but even then, it would have been a toss-up between black suits. At the table, West opted for a Diamond lead and 3Nt was an easy make of 10 tricks. That was 430 to North-South.

In the Closed Room, South took a different route.



South bid 2S and North bid 3Nt. It doesn't seem right to have the lead go through a four-King holding. As luck would have it, East had an automatic Club lead and the 3Nt contract went down two for 100 to East-West. Could we call it some kind of a poetic justice? I will leave it to you. Mavericks pulled back 11 IMPs on this board to open their account.

Board 9 was a push board, however, it was not an uninteresting board.

Both North and South had a massively distributional hand with a 7-4-2-0 shape. The bidding progressed naturally with a two over one 2♣ response by South to North's 1♥ opening bid. Kaustubh Bendre chose the 4♣ continuation over North's third Heart bid. On North's 4♦ continuation, however, he wasn't perhaps sure that a 4♠ Cue bid will find both the partners on the same page. Kaustubh took a safe shot at 5♣. That made 12 easy tricks.

In the Open Room, Keyzad rebid 2 •, not 2 •. Further bidding was almost similar and the final contract, the same. A push board as mentioned above.

Running Scores: Hemant Jalan 29 IMPs - Mavericks 11.

On Board 10, Sandeep Thakral had the last laugh for the Mavericks. It was a meagre **2**♥ contract, but the defence was a beauty.

The bidding was the same at both the tables.

In the Open Room, Datta opted to lead the A and shifted to a small Club. Had the Declarer played small from the Dummy, defence would have had no further chance. Of course, Declarer didn't make that speculative play. He went for &King from the Dummy, won with A by Manna. Manna had a chance to defeat by shifting to a *small* trump, but Manna continued Clubs allowing the Declarer to embark on a sort of cross-ruff. Defence only got three trumps in the later play.

In the Closed Room, Jaggy and Sandeep Thakral showed what killing defence smells like.



Jaggy led a small Diamond. Declarer won and played a Spade to the ♠9 in the Closed hand to Jaggy's ♠T. Jaggy persisted with a Diamond. Declarer won and played the ♣King from the Dummy. Sandeep Thakral won ♣A and figured out why the Declarer was wandering all over the jungle of side suits. Thakral switched to the ♥2!

Jaggy won the ♥Q and played another trump defanging the Declarer. After the ♥AK, Thakral switched to the ♣9 not wanting ever to be on the lead again, with all his lowly Spades. ♣Nine went to Declarer's ♣T, Jaggy's ♣J and

Dummy's Queen. Declarer now ruffed a Diamond and ruffed a Spade in the Dummy. The Ace fell so there were many good Spades in the Dummy but no own route to get there. With  $\bullet$ T and \*74, Declarer played the \*4 from the Dummy. With his  $\bullet$ J and \*85, Jaggy claimed the rest of the tricks. Down 3 was the result for +300 to EW. Mavericks pulled back Nine more IMPs on this deal to finish the session with a respectable 20-29 look. Hemant Jalan team got 13.4 VPs for their effot.

That was a lovely session to watch and hopefully, this narrative should be instructive for the new and advancing players.
